His the female mosquito, it may be possible to lure the males to destruc tion, and thus overcome the pest. A discovery that engenders such . a hope has been reported by Prof. Elihu Thomson of the General Electric Company. To quote a press bulleting issued by the company's news bur

eau: "Thousands of male mosquitoe met death, last summer, in the laboratory directed by Professor Thom son, because they mistook the steady hum set up by a large electric fur nace equipment for the song of the 'female of the species,' and swarmed in great numbers over the furnace only to be sizzled in the scorch

ing air. "The loud drone could be heard throughout the region surrounding the building, and was evidently audible to delicate insect ears in an ex-tensive marshy district just outside the plant. To mosquitoes in that locality the sound of the electric furnace must have seemed like the chant of a multitude of their females all humming in unison.

"The males flew toward the hum and a few moments later were dead on the cover of the furnace.

"Countless numbers of their dead and a severe cast of countenance. bodies were observed there by the aboratory workers.

"Prof. George H. Parker of the department of zoology at Harvard University told Professor Thomson there is plausibility in the explana tion which occurred to him. Female mosquitoes. Professor Parker said. hum to attract the males, which are silent.

"'It is easy,' said Professor Thon on, to organize an electro-magnetic "hummer" which, at small expense of energy, can spread over a large space the peculiar hum and attract the males; perhaps also repelling the females. Various ways of trap-ping the males may be suggested, as they need not be desiccated or cooked to get rid of them. They may be

burned, or drowned or shocked. "'Certainly, if the male can be drawn to a spot and destroyed, the egg-laying power of the female would be curtailed, and we shall have a great diminution in the mosquito population. It is possible even that the whole race of them can be thus decimated or extinguished by proper utilization of these principles."

#### 124-Yr.-Old British Firm Makes Record Motors

London.-The makers of the ensines which hold the world's land and air speed records started business 124 years 250 as producers of printing machinery. Now known 25 the builders of Britain's Schneider Trophy, automobile and speed boat record breaking motors, the firm of D. Napler & Son was established in 1808. Within a few years its newspaper printing machinery was being extensively used in London and Ireland. A special machine for print-ing Bibles in rare Oriental languages, invented by D. Napier before 1830, is still in use today.

ments have been invented and manufactured by the company.

Automation coin weighing and sort-

ing apparatus was perfected in 1851. Other manufactures included astroncmical telescopes, guns, rolling mills, bulets, numbering machines, emboss-ing and perforating gear for postage stamps, stern engines, tide guages, ships' compasses and centrifugal sugar machines.

The automobile enterprise was not launched until 1898, and it was a small step from the automobile motor to the airplane engine. The firm is now specializing in the production of highspeed aero engines.
