Held their regular meeting May 7th. The Reeve and all members were present, the minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Mr. Blak, Road Superintendent, presented Voucher No. 4, for road improvements which by resolution was accepted and payments ordered—total amount being \$434.41.

By-law No. 753 providing for expenditure on township roads for 1932 was passed. Total estimated expenditure \$10,700, one copy to be forwarded to the Department of Highways at Toronto.

Boyd - McKechnie—That the following accounts be paid: R. G. Peart, balance salary as assessor, \$15; treasurer, telephone messages, \$1; exchange, postage and reg., from Dec. 12th, 1931, to date, \$14.08; T. J. Brodie, 1 day committee work, \$2.50; S. H. Wright, ½ day committee work, \$1.25; J. McKechnie, 1½ days committee work, \$3.75.—Carried.

McGirr - McKechnie—That treasurer be authorized to accept arrears of taxes amounting to \$74.66 on lot 1 of 30, con. 4, E.G.R.—Carried.

McGirr - McKechnie—That the clerk be instructed to notify the County Treasurer to erase from his books the arrears of taxes against certain lots in the township of Glenelg.—Carried.

Wright - Boyd—That the Court of Revision for the Township of Glenelg for 1932 be held on Saturday, May 28th, 1932, at the Township Hall at 1 p.m. and that the Clerk be instructed to advertise same in Markdale and the Durham papers.—Carried.

To Decide on Women Elders
The General Council of the United Church of Canada will meet in Hamilton on September 18th, when commissions from all parts of the Dominion will meet for the biennial convention, lasting about 10 days. Among many questions of outstanding importance which will come before the commissioners will be the final decision in the matter of women elders. The vote has been put to the individual congregations, and a favorable report has been brought in representative of the opinion of a large number of presbyteries and congregations. There will have to be ratification of the General Assembly, however, before anything definite is decided.

Arrested in Toronto
A young man, who goes by the name of Willard F. Storey and who claims to be from British Columbia, was arrested at West Toronto Station as he stepped from the special train on Saturday. He is supposed to have issued cheques here with no funds to cover them and on learning that he had gone to Toronto that morning County Constable Arthur Johnston telephoned the information to the Toronto police. When they made the arrest the city detectives discovered that he was wanted in Toronto on six charges of fraud and four in Windsor. He is also wanted in Buffalo on fraud charges.

J. C. Templin completed thirty years as editor of the Fergus News-Record on May 1st.

Orangeville Council will plant 1500 trees which they have secured from the Forestry Department.
Mr. David Allan, Clerk of Egremont, suffered a stroke recently and his condition is considered serious.

J. R. Hoare has been elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. E. Thompson, Reeve of Orangeville.
Rev. Levi Halfyard, B.C., of Shelburne has received and accepted a call to the United Church at Tottenham.

Lytle Thompson has been elected Deputy-Reeve of Mono to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Thos. J. Parks.
The Newmarket Era has gone back to the ownership of Lyman Jackson who sold it a year ago to Arthur Hawkes.

On Friday, May 6th, Rev. E. C. Currie, formerly of Sault Ste. Marie was inducted as pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Creemore.
David Malcolm of Collingwood, a member of the crew of the steamer Mapleton, was drowned in the Lachine Canal a week ago Saturday.

The Kincardine-Reporter, for 27 years edited and published by the late J. J. Hunter, has been sold by Mrs. Hunter to Mr. Fred Davies of Kingston.
John Biggar of St. Vincent was badly injured when hit by a car driven by W. N. Artley of Meaford. Biggar was riding a bicycle when the accident occurred.

Oscar Irwin of Kilgore had one of his arms amputated in order to save his life. Blood poisoning following a cut which he received while cutting wood was the cause.
Rev. Father Nicholas Roche, parish priest at Owen Sound and Chatsworth, died early Monday morning after a few days illness. He was 62 years of age and was born in Ireland.

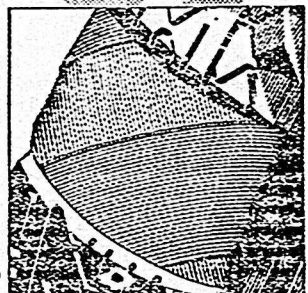
