Dufferin and Peel Presbyterian W. M. S.

The seventh annual meeting of Dufferin and Peel Presbyterian W. M. S., United Church, was held in First Avenue United Church, Orangeville, Thursday, May 12th, with a good attendance. Miss Louisa Mayowna of Czechoslovakia, who is attending the United Church Training School in Toronto, contributed one of the happiest memories of the convention. Dressed in a native costume, gay striped skirt, waist and apron, with snowy blouse and shawled head, Miss Mayowna was a charming figure, while her message of christian service, performed with a love for humanity, shining with the inspiration of Jesus Christ himself, found the heart of everyone of her hearers. Speaking in a quaint, though warm and colorful English, Miss Mayowna described how she had come to Canada. She was invited to come out two years ago by the United Church W.M.S., following her services as interpreter to Rev. Riout during his travels in Russia, Poland, the Ukraine and other countries in Central Europe. Miss Mayowna speaks many languages and very humorous was her description of her initial experience of the English language from books and dictionaries. She was invited to come to Canada for special work to serve the new Canadians at the doors of Canada, namely, the ports of entry. She started her duties at Saint John, N. B., later being stationed at Quebec until immigration was closed owing to Canada, under present conditions being unable to assimilate more people. Very vividly she described the lonely foreigner, who arrives in a strange country where even the tongue is unfamiliar to him. It is so easy to get into trouble, said Miss Mayowna, when you do not understand. Miss Mayowna paid tribute to Dr. Dow, lecturer at the Mission School, who, she said, had given her her most beautiful picture of Christ. "He can show you Christ," she said, "because he lives so close to him." Miss Mayowna did extensive social service work in Germany as a nursing deaconess, in Russia, Poland, etc.

The report of Nominating Committee was then presented by Mrs. S. G. Steel, of Caledon, after which Mrs. Beswick, of Orangeville, took charge of the installation of officers and in her capable and impressive talk gave her hearers a vision of womanhood in relation to Christ.

Weed Inspectors Meet

The Grey County Weed Inspectors, Road Superintendents, Reeves and Deputy-Reeves held their annual meeting in the office of the Department of Agriculture here on Friday last. Mr. A. R. G. Smith addressed the gathering. He dealt at length re the administration of the Weed Act. He stressed the many clauses and mentioned briefly the proposed amendments to the present Act, the chief being the possibility of adding any weeds to the list which may prove troublesome in certain localities. Another was the possibility that Weed Inspectors would be granted power to control threshing outside. Many farmers having duty fields would thresh in the field with the resultant clouds of weed seeds scattered far and wide.

The afternoon session was taken up by throwing on screen pictures of a large number of noxious and other weeds with seeds of the same. Representatives were present from most of the townships in the county. Normanby, Collingwood, Proton, St. Vincent, Egremont, Glenelg, Holland and others were among those noticed. Mr. A. R. G. Smith, the Western Ontario Supervisor of Weed Inspectors, will be in the county during the summer on the work, checking up the clean-up being made.

Sunday Fishing

Desecration of the Lord's Day is becoming more and more prevalent and in view of this we insert a few extracts from Ontario Lord's Day Laws:

1. It is not lawful for any person on that day (Sunday) to go out fishing, or to take, kill or destroy any fish, or to use any gun, fishing rod, net or other engine for that purpose.

2. It is not lawful for any person on that day to go out hunting or shooting or in quest of, or to take, kill or destroy any deer or other game or any wild animal or any wild fowl or bird, or to use any dog, gun, rifle, or other engine for that purpose.
