News and Information for the Busy Farmer

Furnished by the Ontario Department of Agriculture

Prof. J. Eaton Howitt, head of the Botany Department, O. A. C., has prepared a booklet which delves thoroughly into the various types of weeds found in Ontario. It is well illustrated and gives a vast amount of information.

Trap the Borer
The suggestion has been advanced that a trap crop of corn consisting of about half a dozen rows of early sown rapid growing corn, if put in as early as the ground is fit, will in most years lessen the amount of injury done the main crop by the corn borer, if the main crop is sown a few days later than the ideal date. The trap crop should be cut low about the end of the first week in August, when all borer eggs have been laid and should be removed and fed to live stock.

Poultry—A Farm Asset
Official records show that the poultry population of Canada has doubled each ten years during the period of the past thirty years. Each succeeding period of low prices for farm products finds the poultry flock coming to the farmer's rescue. At the present time it can easily be shown that the poultry flock properly bred, housed, and looked after is, from the standpoint of capital investment and feed cost, one of the best paying lines of farm effort. Each succeeding year appears to make it more clear that the farm is the logical place for the development of the poultry industry with respect to both egg and meat production. The farm flock is a useful medium for the marketing of otherwise unsaleable products in the form of eggs and poultry meat. Banks and loan companies find the farm which has a poultry flock a much better risk than the one which has none.
