Mrs. S. Roy Dead

Mrs. Stephen Roy, an old resident of Artemesia township, passed away on Friday last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. David Williams, in town. The deceased, whose maiden name was Sarah Hills, was born near Stratford in 1850, where she was married to the late Stephen Roy in 1865. Together they came to Artemesia township and took up land one and a quarter miles east of Eagenia.

To the union were born eleven children of whom six are living, namely: Lizzie (Mrs. Oscar Erickson) of Caldwell, N.J.; George, Mono Centre; Etta (Mrs. A. Stillwell) of N.J.; Nellie (Mrs. Jos. Candler) N.J.; Alice (Mrs. Jos. Thompson) Feversham; and Jennie (Mrs. David Williams) of Flesher-ton, all but one of whom were present for the funeral.

One son was killed overseas in the Great War. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, when service was conducted in the Flesher-ton Baptist Church, of which deceased was a member, and a comforting sermon was preached by her pastor, Rev. J. R. Wolsteincroft. Miss Jean Wolsteincroft sang a very beautiful solo and the choir of the church chanted "Abide With Me." Those present besides the immediate family were: Dr. Harry and Mrs. Hills and Mr. West of Wellesley, Ont., Mr. and Mrs. John Walker of Credit Forks and Mr. and Mrs. Erickson of Mono Centre.

Interment took place in the family plot in Salem Cemetery. The pallbearers were: Messrs. F.W.H. Hickling, A. E. Bellamy, W. A. Hawken, J. O. Dargavel, Jos. Field and Levi Betts.

The floral offerings were very beautiful, including items from the family and neighbors, that covered the casket in a bower of bloom.

The deceased lady was an inveterate knitter and has knitted hundreds of mittens and socks for church and benevolent organizations and during the war knitted for the soldiers. She had forty pairs of mittens on hand when the summons came. Hers was a practical Christianity such as the world knows too little of. She was full of years and good works, and her family can bless her memory. —Flesher-ton Advance.

May Ask Control of School Boards

School boards in the province of Ontario are responsible to the rate-payers only. The council has nothing to do with them other than vote the monies they require. We make this statement to contradict an impression that the town or township councils control the expenditure of money for school purposes.

They have no control whatever, but if a petition sent over the province by the London city council receives sufficient support from other urban and rural centres, this is to change and the council placed in control over the boards. This circular, released on May 6th, is now in the hands of the municipal clerks of Ontario and there will likely be some heated discussion around the council tables at the June meeting.

No matter what happens, there is little likelihood of the law being changed for some time. The municipal councils may petition, and the provincial board of education may give them a patient hearing, but it is the feeling of the people which will finally decide the issue. There are those who would favor this move; others will take just as strong a stand against it.

Tax on Telephone Messages

At the session of the Dominion Parliament just closed legislation was passed taxing telephone messages and for the benefit of our subscribers who are also telephone subscribers we publish the following information:— Where a long distance call is made by a telephone subscriber the tax is six per cent. of the charge of the call, not less than 15 cents.

When a call is made from a public pay station, whether operated by means of automatic slot machine or otherwise, a tax of five cents for each such call for which a charge of more than 25 and not more than 80 cents is made and 5 cents for each additional charge of eighty cents or fraction of 80 cents.

Other clergy present were Fathers McNulty and Vahay of Owen Sound; Father Doyle of Mt. Forest; Father Leahard of Kenilworth; Fathers Joseph McConnell, Francis McCreary of Hamilton and Father Harris of Caledonia. There was a large congregation present, the Church being filled to capacity. The choir was under the direction of Mrs. W. J. Arrowsmith of Markdale with Miss Blanche McClarty as organist. The Archbishop was the guest of Father Grace at the Rectory on Wednesday.

Enormous Spider Found by Grocer

Mr. Lloyd Taylor, a Guelph grocer, had an unusual experience one evening recently. He was in the act of cutting bananas from a large bunch of that fruit and suddenly came upon a big spider, hidden in the centre of the cluster. The insect, of the type known as the banana spider, was a large specimen, being about four inches or more in circumference. Mr. Taylor and others in the store succeeded in capturing the insect alive and placed it in a large glass charge, after which it was put on display in one of the windows of the store. Mr. Taylor intends to turn over the poisonous visitor to the O.A.C.
