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## Decoration Service

Sunday last was Decoration Day at Markdale Cemetery and there was a large gathering present for the ceremony. The Odd Fellows, under whose auspices this annual event is held, are to be congratulated on their enterprise in making this a real community affair. On their invitation this year the members of the Flesherston Company of the Grey Regiment led the parade with the members of the Canadian Legion coming next. The Owen Sound City Band headed the Odd Fellows' lodge and members of the Orange Order followed. It was quite an imposing sight. On arrival at the cemetery, Mr. A. E. Hunt, Noble Grand, took charge. Those taking part in the services were Messrs. Harry Shaw, P.G.; J. C. Mercer, P.G.; W. J. Howard, P.D.D.G.M., and W. J. Colgan, P.G.

The wreath was placed above the tablet containing the names of those who gave their lives in defence of the Empire and the veterans also placed a wreath on the grave of the only one of their comrades buried here, the late Harry Leslie. Bouquets were placed on the graves of ten deceased members of the Odd Fellows' lodge who are buried here and the names of five others buried elsewhere mentioned. The graves of 73 members of the Orange Order were visited and bouquets placed thereon.

Altogether it was one of the most successful decoration services yet held.

John Parker Walton, a highly respected resident of the village, passed away on Monday afternoon, June 13th, in Dr. R. L. Carefoot's private hospital here. He had been in failing health for the past two years and had been a patient in the hospital for about two months.

The late Mr. Walton was born in Innisfil Township, County of Simcoe on December 5th, 1869, the son of Hugh and Harriet Walton of Artemesia Township. In 1888 he married Miss Martha Green of Heathcote. They resided in Owen Sound and Holland Centre for a number of years, coming to Markdale in 1914. Mrs. Walton predeceased him in 1930. Since her death he had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Wm. G. Bowles of the west backline.

The deceased was of a very quiet and retiring disposition, a kind neighbor and a regular attendant of Annesley Church when health and circumstances permitted.

Besides his daughter, three sisters and three brothers, survive, namely, Mrs. John Alexander of Thornbury, Mrs. Robert Wright of Clarksburg, Miss Lucy and Henry Walton of Kimberley, Fred F. of Sault Ste. Marie and Hugh A. of Fort Hammond, B.C.

The funeral took place from the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. W. G. Bowles, on Wednesday afternoon. Service in the home at 2 o'clock. Interment was made in the Markdale Cemetery.

## U. F. O. Annual Meeting

R. A. Lawson of Durham was elected president of the South-East Grey U.F.O. Political Association at the annual meeting in Flesherston on Saturday. Mr. R. D. Carruthers, president for the past several years, was appointed honorary president of the Association. Sympathy was extended to Mr. Carruthers owing to his illness. Other officers elected were Vice-pres., W. H. Hunter, Durham; Sec.-treas., Wilfred Graham, Markdale, succeeding Harold McKechnie of Durham, who has served efficiently for several years. After lunch the annual U.F.O. meeting was held and encouraging reports were given by the directors of the U.F.O., U.F.W.O. and U.F.Y. P.O. societies, Mr. R. L. Aitchison, Mrs. Lawson and Jos. Crutchley, respectively and the auditors report showed a healthy condition.

A discussion was raised regarding County paving and a resolution was passed to be presented to the County Council requesting that the Council abide with their decision of not paving this year, which they made at the January session.

There was a strong feeling throughout the meeting to have a large delegation from Grey join the larger delegation which is meeting in Ottawa on July 16th, requesting wider markets for Canadian agricultural products.

Reports from the various Co-operative stores were made by Mr. Jos. Crutchley of Durham, Mr. H. Bailey of Dundalk and Mr. G. Magee of Flesherston.

E. J. Garland, M.P. from Bow River, Alta., was the main speaker of the afternoon and his address of an hour and a half duration was very interesting. He dwelt on general conditions of the agricultural people and how to remedy the present depression throughout the world. He claimed that the fault mainly lies at the door of the great financial houses in their refusal to grant any great amount of credit. Mr. Garland said that the world should go off the gold standard and urged the inflation of Canadian currency, declaring that the gold standard is a superstition and that it is by virtue of this superstition that the banks can defraud the people. He also mentioned the high interest in its recent loan, but stated that the rate paid by the Province of Ontario government could not help this as they are forced to set a high interest rate by the bankers, who are thus at a time when the pay of the workers is being greatly cut, raising the wage of Capital.

The hall was well filled for the meeting and every seat was taken. Mr. Garland, along with Miss A. C. Macphail, and F. R. Oliver, M.P.P., spoke at a meeting at Chatsworth Friday evening and at Dundalk on Saturday evening.—Flesherston Advance.

## Grey Deanery Meeting

The spring meeting of the Deanery of Grey which was held on Thursday last in St. George's Anglican Church, Owen Sound, was attended by a large number of delegates, and was thoroughly representative of all parts of the Deanery, with both the clergy and laity taking an active interest in the proceedings of the day. The sessions opened by the celebration of the Holy Communion, which was in charge of Ven. Archdeacon W. J. Doherty of London who was assisted by Rev. W. H. Dunbar of St. George's Church and Rev. J. H. Geoghegan of St. Thomas' Church. Rural Dean R. P. D. Hurford of Shelburne preached the sermon from Revelations, "Hear what the spirit saith to the churches." Dinner was served from 12.15 to 1.30 p.m., by the ladies of St. George's and St. Thomas' congregations.

The Laymen, under President Robert Ferguson of Clarksburg, met in the basement of the church and a large number were present from the various churches throughout the Deanery and discussed many problems connected with the congregations. Mr. S. F. Bellache of Paisley was present and gave an excellent address and Mr. J. H. Hartman of Meaford, former Lay Commissioner, also addressed the gathering. It was decided to hold a Deanery picnic in the latter part of August at a place to be decided upon later. The following officers were elected: Hon. President, Robt. Ferguson, Clarksburg; President, J. H. Hartman, Meaford; Vice-President, Dr. J. H. Zinn of Shelburne.

The Women's Auxiliary met in the church and was presided over by Mrs. A. L. Hamilton, President, of Owen Sound who conducted the devotional exercises. There were 67 delegates present and also a large number of visitors. The Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Margaret Carr, reported that \$1,337.00 had been contributed from the Deanery W.A. for the Western Relief Fund.

The report of the Diocesan delegates to the Annual at London was splendidly given by Mrs. Robert Frizzell and Mrs. William Miller of Bognot. A long discussion ensued over the apportionment of the Bursary Fund, a fund for educating missionaries' children, and before adjourning arrangements were completed to pack a bale of articles contributed. Carr, Owen Sound; Dorcas Secretary, Miss Fuller, Meaford.

Mr. Dixon, son of the late Canon Dixon of Toronto, Trinity Church, who has been a missionary in India for some years, gave an excellent and thoughtful address on India to all the delegates and visitors in the church at 4 o'clock. Supper was served to the visiting delegates in the Parish Hall at the conclusion.

The next place of meeting will be in Chatsworth in the fall of 1932, and at Meaford in the spring of 1933.
