Increasing Yields

The application of a definite scheme of crop rotation is being found an important factor in reducing feed costs. The chief advantages of such a practice are: (1) Maintaining and improving soil fertility, thus increasing yields; (2) Assisting in weed control; (3) Assisting in the control of insect and crop diseases by having various crops on fresh soil each year; and it makes a more even distribution of labor throughout the year possible. Increasing the yield per acre is one of the best ways of reducing cost of production, and in this respect crop rotation plays a real part.

Why Hens Stop Laying

A flock that has laid heavily during the winter will generally slow up toward the middle of the summer when they begin to moult, but when the egg yield drops rapidly until it practically ceases without any apparent reason, then suspect vermin. Body lice, which remain on the birds, and the red mite which infests the poultry house during the day, returning to the birds at roosting time, causes heavy losses. Mr. F. C. Elford, Dominion Poultry Husbandman, recommends for the former dusting the birds for lice with powder and applying blue ointment beneath the wings; and for the red mite he recommends a strong solution of zenozeum, applied to the cracks in the roosts and nest boxes at regular intervals throughout the summer. Coal oil applied in similar fashion at intervals is also recommended.

A Turkey Club

The latest in clubs for farm boys and girls is a Turkey Club operating in Norfolk County under auspices of the Simcoe Rotary Club in co-operation with the local agricultural representative, F. C. Patterson. Each Rotarian has furnished a boy or girl with five young turkeys. Instructions for raising them are given by the Department. Next fall each Rotarian will receive one full-grown turkey as the return on his investment. The aim is to interest Norfolk boys and girls in turkey-raising and to improve the breed of turkeys in this county.

Turkey breeding is not the difficult undertaking that is generally supposed when the breeding stock and poulters are properly handled. Essentials to success in turkey breeding are: clean soil, mature stock for breeding, free range and above all, the keeping of the turkey flock away from other barn-yard fowls.

Farm Labor

The following report from the representative in North Simcoe is rather significant: "In spite of dozens of men passing through Barrie daily, it has not always been easy to secure men to fill applications for farm help. A percentage of this floating labor population is, of course, not well qualified for farm work, but on the other hand few of those with experience are willing to accept farm work at the general rate of \$15 per month."

Premium Willingly Paid by Toronto Consumers

There is a contention that the consumer is prepared, usually, to pay a premium for a higher quality, and a more attractively packed farm product. This thought was exemplified lately on the Toronto wholesale market when the prices of 11-quart baskets of Ontario-grown asparagus ranged from \$1 to 1.50. From the ready acceptance of the \$1.50 baskets, it was apparent that buyers were willing to pay the higher price when receiving infinitely better quality and a more attractive pack.

New Merchandising Idea Reported by J. A. Carroll

J. A. Carroll, secretary, Ontario Marketing Board, whose study of markets and marketing took him to Detroit recently, has reported a new type of merchandising. Mr. Carroll observed that eight retail markets had been opened under such names as "packers' warehouse" and "canners' warehouse." These markets are not in any way elaborate, and personnel is cut to a minimum, consisting in most cases of a cashier and a limited number of clerks who act as guides. Business is conducted entirely on a self-serve basis. "It was pointed out to me," said Mr. Carroll, "that this 'warehouse' idea was designed to give the consumer the greatest amount of high quality food for the most reasonable price. This, of course, would be effected through the media of buying direct from producers in carload lots; eliminating the usual retail store fixtures and decoration, except those which are absolutely essential; and reducing the amount of help to the lowest, efficient degree. "One firm informed me," he went on, "that if its first warehouse proved successful no hesitancy would be shown in establishing a chain of these shopping centres." These warehouses have been in-

stalled in vacant buildings, conveniently located on bus and trolley routes. For shoppers who arrive in private cars, ample free parking space is provided. While this scheme was first tried in Detroit, a few months ago, it has now spread to several other American cities.

Chemical Weed Killers

Farmers, gardeners and others are looking for an easy and effective way of destroying small patches of perennial weeds. The Department of Botany at the O.A.C. has been experimenting with chemical weed killers for the past four years. The results obtained from these experiments would warrant making the following statements regarding the destruction of small patches of weeds. Field Bindweed and Twitch Grass may be killed by three applications of Atlacide, Weed Cop or Sodium Chlorate. The strengths required are 1 pound per gallon of water of Atlacide or Weed Cop per 100 sq. ft., or 1 pound per gallon of water of Sodium Chlorate per 400 square feet. The first application should be given when the weeds are in full bloom, the second three weeks later, and the third a month later. Blue-weed and Burdock can be killed by one application of Sodium Chlorate at the rate of 8 ounces per gallon of water per 400 square feet ad by one application of Atlacide or Weed Cop at the rate of 1 pound per gallon of water per 100 square feet.

Poison Ivy may be killed with one or two applications of Atlacide or Weed Cop at the rate of 1 pound per gallon of water per 100 square feet. The first application may be made as soon as the plant leaves out, and a second spraying with the solution given if the plants begin to leaf out again in three or four weeks' time.

Perennial Sow Thistle may be destroyed by two or three applications of Atlacide or Weed Cop, the rate of application being 2 pounds per gallon of water per 100 square feet. The first application should be given just as the thistle commences to bloom, the second three weeks later, and if new growth appears, another application of the same strength should be given.

Ox-eye Daisy and Wild Carrot may be destroyed by one application of Atlacide or Weed Cop at the rate of 1 pound per gallon of water per 100 sq. ft., and by one application of sodium chlorate at the rate of 1 pound per gallon of water per 400 sq. ft. The applications should be made just as these weeds are coming into flower.

Sodium Chlorate is one of our best and cheapest chemical weed killers. Its use, however, cannot be recommended unreservedly because of the danger of fire in handling it.
