The Society will engage in business as wholesale purchasers, procurers, shippers and vendors of and dealers in goods, wares and merchandise of every description used in agriculture or by consumers, including hardware, lumber, building materials, fuel, machinery, farm implements, binder twine, drygoods and groceries. Flesherston Old Boys and Girls in Toronto will celebrate in the old home town on Civic Holiday, August 1st.

Mrs. James McComb, an old resident of Melancthon township, passed away on June 30th, in her 83rd year.

Matt Rohmer of Orangeville will be one of a picked team to represent Canada at the Olympic Lacrosse games in August.

The C.P.R. have discontinued train service over the old T.G. and B. railway from Bolton to Orangeville and will tear up the track if the township through which it passes are not successful in their fight to have a train service continued.

GLENELG COUNCIL

Council met for regular business on July 2nd, 1932, at township hall. All members present. Minutes of last meeting were read and passed.

Communications were read from Robt. Wright, P.S.I. South Grey, advising that township, school grant to public schools from this date shall be \$600 for each Principal and \$400 for each assistant in Glenelg. Mr. A. R. Smith, District Weed Inspector, addressed the Council at some length on the necessity of enforcing the Weed Control Act as vigorously as possible. He laid particular stress on necessity of keeping down such weeds as Oxeye Daisy, Blue-weed, Chicory, etc., advocated pasturing of cattle and sheep on roads not only as a source of revenue to the township, but also as a means of controlling weeds on roadsides.

Mr. M. Black, Road Superintendent, presented report No. 6 for road improvements amounting to the sum of \$3,508.07, was passed and payments ordered.

The Clerk was instructed to notify County Treasurer to erase from his books arrears of taxes against Lot 55, concession 3, N.D.R.

Wright - McKechnie—That Commissioners be paid for committee work as follows: John McGirr, one and a half days and telephoning, \$4.00; John McKechnie, three days, \$7.50; A. H. Wright, 3 days, \$7.50; J. A. Boyd, 3 days, \$7.50; T. J. Brodie, 2 days, \$5.00.—Carried.

Boyd - Wright—That taxes for 1932 be collected through the banks and that 1 per cent. discount be allowed on all taxes paid on or before the 10th day of November, 1932, and that 3 per cent. be added to all taxes unpaid after the 24th day of December, 1932.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to August 6th, 1932.
