### GLENELG COUNCIL

Council met for regular business on July 2nd, 1932, at township hall. All members present. Minutes of last meeting were read and passed. Communications were read from Robt. Wright, P.S.I. South Grey, advising that township, school grant to public schools from this date shall be \$600 for each Principal and \$400 for each assistant in Glenelg. Mr. A. R. Smith, District Weed Inspector, addressed the Council at some length on the necessity of enforcing the Weed Control Act as vigorously as possible. He laid particular Aug. 8th-Markdale at Inistioge. stress on necessity of keeping down such weeds as Oxeye Daisy, Blueweed. Chicory, etc., advocated pas turing of cattle and sheep on roads not only as a source of revenue to the township, but also as a means of controlling weeds on roadsides.

Mr. M. Black, Road Superintendent, presented report No. 6 for road improvements amounting to the sum of \$3,508.07, was passed and payments ordered.
