## Alexander B. McDuff

Word was received here on Tuesday of the death early that morning of Mr. Alexander B. McDuff of Brooklin, Ont. He had been ill for some time and was taken to the hospital for an operation. The funeral will take place at Markdale Cemetery on Thursday. Service will be held in Christ Church at 2:30 o'clock.

The late Mr. McDuff was born here 67 years ago and spent his early days in this community. He was married to Miss Emily Stephens and about thirty-five years ago they moved to Dundalk where the deceased was in the furniture and undertaking business for some years. About ten years ago they moved to Brooklin where a general store business was purchased. He is survived by his widow, two sons, Jack and Thornton and two daughters, Jean and Mildred. John McDuff of this place is a brother.
