Editorial Notes

Toronto exhibition opens next week.

An effort is being made to reduce the salaries of the officials of the railway companies in the United States in an endeavour to reduce the cost of operation. If this is successful Canadian railways will follow the example.

The work of the Imperial Conference is about completed and it looks as though the results will benefit all parts of the Empire. Wheat, copper and lumber are three Canadian products on which Britain will give preference.

Jim Kennedy, a maimed soldier, was notified several months ago of his appointment as postmaster at Shelburne but up to date he has not been permitted to take charge of the office. The veterans are now trying to find out why their comrade has been thus dealt with.

Allan Bell, Reeve of Durham and Warden of Grey County, believes that the Sabbath should be observed as a day of worship and last week was the only member of the Durham Council to oppose the request of Chesley band for permission to give a program there on Sunday evening. Mr. Bell took the stand that there were six other evenings in the week on which people could be entertained by the band without interfering with the services of the churches. If we had more men with the convictions of Warden Bell Sunday would be better observed as a holy day. This is one Bell that rings true.

Concessions and Advantages

The Imperial Economic Conference is likely to conclude this week, after a series of compromises on a liberal scale, with prospects for trade increases that can be considered somewhat better than reasonably satisfactory all around. This implies that no delegation will secure all it wished, and that most of them will concede more than was anticipated, or, at least, than was originally offered. Thus the negotiations have led to a balancing of extremes, which manifestly will be preferable from a business standpoint to one-sided arrangements, and is likely to be more enduring and provide a more solid foundation for future expansion.

As has been obvious, John Bull's position made him the central figure. He has had to bargain with each Dominion without forgetting that several of them were asking the same concessions from him. He has had to weigh their demands separately and collectively. In one respect this has given him an advantage, for it is not considered unethical in bargaining to pit one seller against another. Nevertheless it has not been forgotten that this is a family conference, with a wish to improve the positions of all.

Mr. Baldwin stated the United Kingdom's attitude in his opening address: "The real importance of Ottawa lies in the fact that it marks the one leading to the development of purely national interests, the point where two roads converge, the other to closer Imperial unity—and to the recognition of advantages in mutual co-operation in trade. If when our task is finished we can say that we have definitely taken this latter road, the actual distance progressed is of minor importance, because progress will continue and in the near future we shall always be approaching nearer and nearer to the goal."

Canada is making progress with the Free State, Newfoundland, Rhodesia and South Africa. Negotiations are under way with regard to modifications of the Australian and New Zealand treaties. These treaties will be changed somewhat, but neither side in each case is likely to get all that is being asked. The same rule applies to the other negotiations. In each instance, however, only the minor part is being eliminated. The result will be held on to 75 per cent. of all that is sought.

The United Kingdom negotiations with India and New Zealand are said to be well and happily advanced. New Zealand's position is simple, as imports do not conflict with secondary industries as in Canada and Australia. New Zealand was more concerned with measures to restore values for primary products, and in this respect will have to be contented with the indirect gains from trade expansion. The Indian delegation is said to be pleased with what has been accomplished, but whatever is done requires authority from the home Government and for this reason affairs are not terminated. It is reported that the question of tariffs on lamb and mutton will be one of the matters to be referred to the committee which is likely to take up unfinished business at the end of the Conference. Australia, it is said, has asked a larger duty than Britain is inclined to give, the latter offering a smaller figure combined with a quota. Britain's delay because of differences of opinion on details, but the general agreement with Australia has been reached is expected to be satisfactory.

There will be satisfaction with the decision to proceed definitely with the matter of grading and standardizing in agricultural and industrial products, and with the prospect of a committee to clean up leftover matters by making recommendations to the respective Governments, the latter being conditional upon a relatively small program.

That there will be no permanent secretary to carry on between conferences has been decided. It, however, the authority of the Trade Commissioners is enlarged, as suggested by Mr. Bennett and the other existing machinery is used to promote Intra-Empire trade more vigorously, the same end may be achieved. The Empire countries need some medium through which to keep up the good work being done at Ottawa, to make certain progress will continue as envisaged by the head of the United Kingdom delegation.
