Presbytery Honors Rev. T. Snowdon

Veteran Minister is presented with Cane by United Church Body
The autumn meeting of Grey Presbytery of the United Church was held on Tuesday, October 18th in the United Church at Flesherston with Rev. E. Baker, chairman, presiding at the opening session. Two new Ministerial members, Rev. A. Laycock of Holland Centre and Rev. A. McNeil of Maxwell and 18 new non-Ministerial members were introduced and welcomed as members. Rev. A. D. Cornett, M.A., B.D. of Knox Church, Owen Sound, was elected as chairman by acclamation. Rev. J. E. Peters of Meaford was re-elected as Secretary and Mr. W. L. Young of Markdale was re-elected Treasurer by acclamation.

The high light of the morning session was the jubilee address of Rev. Thomas Snowdon of Meaford who has reached his 80th year, fifty of which years have been spent in the ministry in Canada. In glowing terms, delivered with warm passion he congratulated the younger men in that they were living in these wonderful times with such splendid opportunities for service in the Kingdom of God as will come to them ere they reach the end of the journey. He told of the first sermon he preached as a lad of 16 in the presence of his mother seated in the congregation front of him and his grandfather who conducted the service seated in the pulpit behind him. His text was "The wicked shall be turned into hell with all the nations that forgot God."
After his moving address Rev. C.

Elmer Kenney conveyed to him the congratulations and good wishes of the Presbytery and in their name presented him with a polished ebony walking stick which has on its gold band the inscription, "Rev. T. Snowdon from Grey Presbytery."

The high light of the afternoon session was the address of Rev. Dr. Bryce, the Secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund of the Church. The address was replete with details regarding income and expenditure. It was stated that no matter in what way prosperity may come to other places it can only come to Canada through conditions that will benefit our agricultural workers. A warm tribute was paid to the worth and loyalty of those who are living in our rural charges. Dr. Bryce was heartily thanked for his address and for his answers to questions asked by several members.

Missionary Report

The report of the Missionary and Maintenance committee was presented by Rev. W. H. Smith of Durham. One of its provisions was that each pastoral charge receive the same allotments as last year and make an earnest endeavour to contribute as much as last year. The thanks of the Presbytery were tendered to the unknown subscriber or subscribers who had forwarded the sum of \$500 to the treasurer of the church in addition to what they had subscribed through the churches with which they were connected.
Rev. E. Baker and Mr. William Martin, Commissioners of the Presbytery to the General Council presented their reports regarding their impressions of the recent meeting of the Council and the legislation that had been enacted regarding the Pension Fund and Divorce.

Duncan \$4.00, Municipal World and The Planet supplies \$4.52 and \$13.52, sheep claims paid H. Patton \$15, J. Porteous \$5, G. Stewart \$10, D. A. Clark \$10, F. Jamieson \$5, C. McDermit \$5, R. Clark \$6, J. Campbell \$10 and valuers, R. Clark \$9, J. Campbell \$3.50.

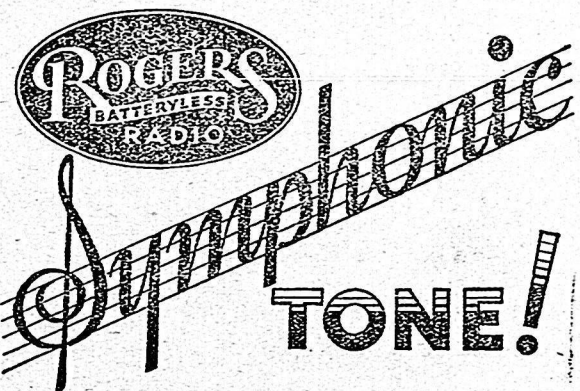
