Mr. John T. Miller passed away early Sunday morning at his home near Rocklyn after a brief illness. The news of his death came as a heard of his illness. He had been in his usual health until about a week previous to his passing, when he had contracted pneumonia.

John Miller was one of the outstanding men of Euphrasia township. For four years he served as Councillor and Deputy-Reeve before being elected to the Reeve's chair. This office he held for 12 years. During the years spent in the County Council he made many sincere friends in all parts of the county.
