Anniversary Services

Anniversary services were held in Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Markdale, on Sunday, Nov. 6th. Rev. S. C. After her marriage to Mr. Dodds they resided in this locality for a short time and then over 30 years ago moved to Rainy River. Some years later they moved to Smith. Another sister, Mrs. John Fowler, lives at Carberry, Man., and a brother, T. J., at Victoria, B.C. The following is clipped from The Northern Observer, published at Sioux Lookout:

After a lengthy illness death claimed Mrs. Wm. Dodds on Tuesday, November 1st, when she quietly passed on to her reward at the local general hospital where she had been a patient for a considerable time.

The deceased lady was with her family, one of the real pioneers of northern Ontario, having resided at Smith, Ont., for the past twenty years, and was highly respected by all who were fortunate enough to know her. The late Mrs. Dodds was a home woman, and devoted her entire time to her family, who has lost a loving mother and a kind and devoted wife. She is survived by her husband and three sons and her age was 69 years 8 months.

The funeral was held from the MacDonald Funeral Home on Wednesday afternoon of this week, and was conducted by Rev. Alex. Cox, who spoke feelingly and with considerable comfort to the bereaved family and the large congregation who gathered to pay their last respects. Interment was made in the Sioux Lookout cemetery. The pallbearers being Dr. W. E. C. Day, J. E. Cole, T. L. Carroll, Edwin Florence, Wm. Clark and Dan Ward.

Charles W. Bellamy

One of the most highly esteemed residents of Fiesherston in the person of Mr. Charles W. Bellamy passed away suddenly on Saturday evening last, aged 82 years. His daughter missed him and on going to the yard she found that he had taken a heart attack and had passed away.

About 12 years ago his wife passed away and he is now survived by one son, Edgar in Chicago, and seven daughters, Mrs. Dinsmore in Saskatchewan; Mrs. Harry Shaw of Markdale; Mrs. Geo. Best of Fiesherston; Mrs. John Miller in British Columbia; Mrs. R. Thistlethwaite in Toronto; Mrs. Melathant in Saskatchewan and Miss Reta at home. He is also survived by one brother and three sisters, namely: Mr. W. J. Bellamy and Miss Kate Bellamy of Fiesherston; Mrs. Henderson and Mrs. Scott of Hanover.

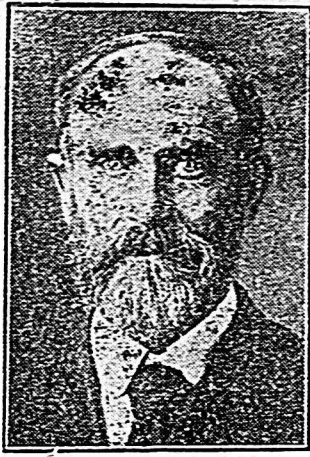
The late Mr. Bellamy was a member of the United Church and the Masonic lodge.

John T. Miller Dead

Ex-Warden of Grey County Passes to His Reward

Mr. John T. Miller passed away early Sunday morning at his home near Rocklyn after a brief illness. The news of his death came as a great shock to friends in all parts of the county as very few had heard of his illness. He had been in his usual health until about a week previous to his passing, when he had contracted pneumonia.

John Miller was one of the outstanding men of Euphrasia township. For four years he served as Councillor and Deputy-Reeve before being elected to the Reeve's chair. This office he held for 12 years. In 1926, the last year of his public service, he served as Warden of the County, a position which he filled with satisfaction to all. During the years spent in the County Council he made many sincere friends in all parts of the county. He was a man of strict integrity and his general disposition made him a popular figure wherever he went.

He was born in Sligo county, Ireland, in 1862 and was therefore in his 51st year. At the age of 21 years he came to Canada and settled in the township of Euphrasia where he has resided since. He was a successful farmer and always took a deep interest in the welfare of the community. In December 1880 he was married to Katherine Irwin, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Irwin, pioneer residents of the township. He is survived by his widow, four sons and five daughters, namely: John, Isaac, Irwin and Charles, all in Euphrasia; Mrs. Wm. Curry, fourth line; Mrs. Jess Patterson and Mrs. Henry Murray at Blyth; Mrs. Isiah Gardiner at Rocklyn, and Mrs. John Hare in St. Vincent.

The late Mr. Miller was a faithful member of St. James' Anglican Church at Fairmount. He was also a member of the Orange Order, being a member of L.O.L. No. 973 at Rocklyn for over 50 years.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon at Lakeview Cemetery at Meaford. After a short service at the house the funeral service was conducted in St. James' Church, Fairmount, by Rev. W. G. Bugler, the rector. The pallbearers were his five sons-in-law, Messrs. Jesse Patterson, Henry Murray, John Hare, Isiah Gardiner and Wm. Curry and a nephew, Mr. Thos. Hall. Many floral tributes were silent tokens of the esteem in which the deceased was held. The members of L.O.L. No. 973 attended in a body and their burial service was read at the grave.

The members of the County Council were all present at the funeral as well as many ex-members and other friends from all parts of the County.

John Taylor Miller was a leader among men and he will long be remembered for his genuine qualities of sincerity and truth. He has gone to his reward but his works shall live on.
