**Corner Stone Laid of
Pricerville's New Church**

Saturday last proved to be a dismal and cheerless day for the corner stone laying of the new Presbyterian Church at Pricerville. The history of Presbyterianism in Pricerville has had a long and honorable existence and this new step is another milestone to mark the traditions and policies of many of the forefathers of the church. As we said, the day without was damp, but the spirit of the people behind the enterprise was bright and optimistic, over the first stages completed in having a new church home. The building faces the main highway and the commodious cement basement was put there by 36 to 50 volunteer workers in two and one half days. The purpose is to complete the basement in sufficient comfort to allow of service being held within this winter.

A large crowd gathered Saturday and first met in McKinnon Hall and were outside for only the actual corner stone laying. This was done by Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney General for Ontario, and Hon. D. Jamieson, Chairman of the Old Age Pensions Board for Ontario. Visiting clergymen present were Revs. T. O. Miller, Markdale; R. Honeyman, Dromore, and B. D. Armstrong, Durham.

The pastor, Rev. Dr. W. J. Melvor, Secy of Building Com., presided over the ceremonies. The invocation was one that gave much thought, viz: "Present us, O Lord, in all our doings, with Thy most gracious favor, and further us with Thy continual help: that in all our works begun, continued and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy holy Name, and finally by Thy mercy obtain everlasting life: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." This was followed by the Apostle's Creed and by the laying of the corner stone, quoting:

"In the name of the Father and of the Son, we lay this corner stone of a house to be erected under the name of the Presbyter-

ian Church, Pricerville, and devoted to the worship of Almighty God. Behold I lay in Zion a chief corner stone, elect, precious, and be that believeth on Him, shall not be confounded." In this place may the faith flourish, the fear of God and love of the brethren. Here may the voice of prayer continually be heard, the voice of rejoicing and of salvation, the voice of praise and invocation of God's most glorious and honorable Name, the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, henceforth and for ever."

In his after remarks, Hon. Mr. Price stated he was not of the Presbyterian faith, but we all pay for the extension of Christ's kingdom in coin, effort and sacrifice. How many of us live up to our convictions? Lack of charity in this old world is the cause of much trouble and we must stand solidly together to combat those who would strive to wreck institutions. Character is built up in adversity. It was our pioneer fathers and mothers that gave character to our country—not money. He hoped the endeavors of the people responsible for this edifice would be successful and also hoped to call again when the church was completed.

Dr. Jamieson was pleased to see the ability uppermost in building a church. He knew many of the "old timers" of Pricerville and had much dealings with them in more ways than one. He liked Pricerville: it was only 10 miles away from the best town in Ontario! The church was needed in these troublous days: Depression was largely due to the Great War in loss of men and money. Yet no country is as well off as Canada. Dr. Jamieson also paid tribute to the work of a minister's wife in any congregation.

Rev. Mr. Miller had great satisfaction in seeing such progress made, and conveyed the congratulations of Orangeville Presbytery. The congregation could not give up the Shorter Catechism and hoped the church would become a blessing to all.

Rev. Mr. Armstrong said the stone had been well and truly laid in Durham in 1925 and agreed with other speakers that there was room for all churches.

Rev. Mr. Honeyman had a double pleasure in meeting with an old friend, Rev. Dr. Melvor. He had spent 22 years with him in Northern Saskatchewan. He had also walked on the heather that had been red with the blood of the martyr. The Presbyterian church is the daughter of the old Scottish church and was proud of the progress they were making.

Mr. Thos. Nichol added a few remarks regarding his pride in being chairman of the building committee and moved a vote of thanks to Hon's. Price and Jamieson and ministers present, which was heartily responded to by the audience.

Rev. Dr. Melvor announced the Anniversary Services at St. Columba United Church on Sunday and hoped all would co-operate.

A splendid 25c supper was later served in the Hall to all visitors.—The Durham Review.
