Corner Stone Laid of Priceville's New Church

Saturday last proved to be a dismal and cheerless day for the corner stone laying of the new Presbyterian Church at Priceville. The history of Presbyterianism in Priceville has had a long and honorable existence and this new step is another milestone to mark the traditions and policies of many of the forefathers of the church. As we said, the day without was damp, but the spirit of the people behind the enterprize was bright and optimistic, over the first stages completed in having a new church home. The building face the main highway and the commodious cement basement was put there by 36 to 50 volunteer workers in two and one half days. The purpose is to complete the basement in sufficient comfort to allow of service

being held within this winter. A large crowd gathered Saturday and first met in McKinson Hall and were outside for only the actual corner stone laying. This was done by Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney Genral for Ontario, and Hon. D. Jamie son, Chairman of the Old Age Pensions Board for Ontario. Visiting clergymen present were Rev's. T. O Miller, Markdale: R. Honeyman Dromore, and B. D. Armstrong, Dur kam.

The pastor, Rev. Dr. W. J. McIvon Sec'y of Building Com., presided or was one that gave much thought, viz

"Present us, O Lord, in all ou doings, with Thy most gracion favor, and further us with Thy continual help: that in all our works begun, continued and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy holy Name, and finally by Thy mercy obtain everlasting life: through Jesus Christ our Lord. - Amen." This was followed by the Apostle's Creed and by the laying of the corn r stone, quoting:

"In the name of the Father and of the Son, we lay this corner stone of a house to be erected under the name of the Presbyter

ian Church, Priceville, and deroted to the worship of Almight? God. 'Behold I lay in Zion a chief corner stone, elect, precions, and he that believeth on Him, shall t be confounded."
