Davis Reeve in Artemesia Brodie in Glenelg

Cecil Meldrum is Deputy-Reeve of Artemesia Statute Labor Defeated in Euphrasia Parker Heads Poll for Council

Considerable interest was taken in the Municipal contests in Artemesia, Euphrasia and Glenelg on Monday and quite a heavy vote was polled in each township.

ARTEMESIA

The Artemesia election was for Reeve and Deputy-Reeve. John A. Davis, who lost to Alex. Cameron in 1932, was elected over Garnet Magee, Deputy this year, by a majority of 186. Wm. Burnett and Cecil Meldrum, members of the Council this year, fought it out for the Deputy-Reeveship and the latter won by a majority of 18. The Councillors, Elmer Warling, I. B. Willsaker and Robt. Purvis, were elected by acclamation. The vote by sub-divisions is given below. 1 is Orange Valley; 2, Flesherston; 3, Proton; 4, Ceylon; 5, Priceville; 6, Vandeleur; 7, Eugenia; 8, Portlaw.

EUPHRASIA

Harold Dawn was elected Reeve of Euphrasia by acclamation and ten candidates were in the field for the four positions on the Council. Herb Parker, the Goring Blacksmith, headed the poll with 339 votes, 26 more than he had a year ago. He championed the cause of the present road system and it was sustained by 452 to 235. He has proposed a method of distributing the work under the system in a manner similar to the Statute Labor and if given the co-operation of the other members of the Council should be able to work out a system profitable to the municipality and satisfactory to all the ratepayers. John J. Miller, a new man, and R. D. Carruthers, a member of this year's Council, are tied for second and third place with 208 each, and Sandy Cook, a former Councillor, is fourth with 204. The vote by sub-divisions is given below. 1 is Duncan; 2, Heathcote; 3, Fairmount; 4, Kimberley; 5, Rocklyn; 6, Beaverdam; 7, Cherry Grove; 8, Goring; 9, Wodehouse.

Thos. J. Brodie was re-elected Reeve of Glenelg by a vote of 429 to 119 for his opponent, J. A. Boyd, who is a Councillor this year. Archie MacCuaig and John McKechnie (Glenroden), a new man, have been elected along with John McGirr and S. H. Wright, now in the Council. John D. Hewitson defeated W. V. Shier, Reeve of Keppel, by a majority of 107, and Robt. Brigham was re-elected Reeve of Hanover by 397.

Markdale people subscribed \$100 for the erection of a Methodist Church at Berkeley.

Alex. Lucas, mayor of Calgary, was a visitor in town.

J. D. Morgan advertised for 50,000 telegraph poles to be delivered in Markdale.

December 4th, 1902

W. Douglas purchased a drug store in Flesherston.

Mrs. George Hepburn

Early on Monday morning Mrs. Geo. Hepburn passed away in her sleep at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Edward Watson, College St. Mrs. Hepburn was formerly Jane Morrison, a daughter of the late Robert and Mrs. Morrison, who came with their family from Ireland in 1851 and settled on the Garafra Road, now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Keller. Mrs. Hepburn was then 12 years of age and has lived to enjoy 93 years. She was a woman of high character and ambitious, permeated with a fine Christian spirit, a great reader and a good neighbor and friend. Until the past few months she took a keen interest in all events taking place. In 1864 she was wedded to William Bradley and they began home-making on the farm now occupied by Norman Schenk. To them were born nine children, three surviving: Martha, Mrs. Robt. Petty, Broderick, Sask.; Sarah, Mrs. Samuel Patterson, and Adeline, Mrs. Edward Watson, Durham. Mr. Bradley passed away on Dec. 26, 1884. In 1887 Mrs. Bradley married George Hepburn. In 1900 they came to reside in Durham and Mr. Hepburn passed away in 1914. For a number of years, Mrs. Hepburn lived in her home on George St. but the past few years made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Watson. She was a member of Queen St. United Church and a regular attendant at worship as long as health warranted. There was a family of ten Morrisons and three brothers still survive: Richard, in Egremont; George, Medicine Hat; Jas. at Grenfell, Sask. The funeral service was held Thursday afternoon to Maplewood cemetery. —The Durham Review

Public Meeting at Rocklyn

A meeting to discuss the road question in Euphrasia township was held in the township hall in Rocklyn on Friday evening last and was attended by quite a large number of ratepayers representing all sections of the township. Mr. T. H. Richardson presided. The speakers were all favorable to the present system of road maintenance and the audience appeared to be of a like mind. From the addresses we would gather that there is not much, if any, complaint about the system, the chief criticism being the administration. Mr. Herb Corbett of Proton Station, Chairman of the County Roads Committee and ex-reeve of Artemesia, was the first speaker and gave much information regarding the grants distributed under the act. Mr. W. I. Field, reeve of Collingwood township, spoke interestingly and gave much information as to the working of the system in his township. Mr. H. W. Kernahan, a former clerk of Osprey township presented several suggestions in order to make the system more popular with all ratepayers. He suggested the collection of taxes in two installments, one payable in July and the other in December with reductions for labor performed in the maintenance of roads. Mr. Wm. Taylor, reeve of Osprey, was also interesting in his talk on the working of the system in his township. Mr. Harold Dawn, the reeve elect for 1933, spoke in favor of retaining the present system as did also several of the candidates for the Council.

The bride and groom were attended on that occasion by Miss Emma Swales, now Mrs. William Heels of Waubesa, and Mr. Ruben of Greenbury, of Agincourt, brother of the bride. Their happy union was blessed by a family of one son and three daughters, all living, namely: Mr. Edgar Gorley at Epping; Mrs. Alfred Hill (Verna), of Artemesia Township; Mrs. Wm. Gregory (Luelia), of Euphrasia Township and Mrs. J. H. Ritchie (Viola), of Oshawa. There are also six grandchildren. In order that all the family might be present the golden wedding celebration was held on Saturday evening previous, when the children with their life partners, and the grandchildren gathered at their home to offer their congratulations and spend a happy evening with them. The party also included Rev. T. O. Miller, pastor of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, and Mrs. Miller.

For the occasion the dining room was decorated with streamers of white and yellow and chrysanthemums in yellow and harmonizing shades.
