RELIEF AHEAD

Under this heading the Liberal Border Cities Star comments favorably on the statement of Hon. Charles McCrea, minister of mines and acting prime minister of Ontario, when he told the automobile manufacturers of Canada that events climaxing by June 1 should effect a general release of money and credit by December next.

Mr. McCrea sees much hope in the launching of a new administration of the United States and the World economic Conference in April. He foresees a world wide lowering of tariffs and giving silver some relative value to gold in a monetary readjustment to be considered by the general meeting of the nations.

"We hear of tariffs as a destructive force to business," Mr. McCrea declares, "and that criticism deserved. Nobody wants high tariffs, and ways and means will be found to reduce those tariffs. A series of events is developing in 1933 which I feel is going to bring about reductions in tariffs."

Trade, and friendly trade, throughout the world is what we all need.

There are many who share Mr. McCrea's optimism and general view of the situation, the Star points out. The other day this paper quoted Mr. Irving Busb, well known New York business leader, as saying that recovery from the depression had definitely started six months ago. There are many signs to support this contention. One of the most important of all is the growing demand for a general reduction in tariffs. Sir John Aldred, president of Canadian Bank of Commerce, gave voice to this in his annual message to the shareholders when he suggested a flat reduction of 10 percent in every tariff country. This will not be done, of course, but it is a sign of the times, an indication that the world is commencing to appreciate the foolishness of maintaining artificial obstacles to the smooth flow of international commerce.—The Alliston Herald.

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
