## ARTEMESIA EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

The Educational Association of the Township of Artemesia met in the hall in Flesherton on Saturday afternoon with a fair attendance.

Several motions were presented, among those finding favor being that in rural school sections the school age be raised from 5 to 6 years; that \$2 of the government grant be withheld from each school section and given to the Provincial Educational Association and in lieu of that each school section be given a copy of the School Journal for one year and the expenses of their delegate paid. A resolution from S. S. No. 14, Artemesia and Euphrasia was presented, as follows: "that Section 109 of the School Act be amended and read so as not to have any bearing on the salaries paid to teachers and that the township school grant be scaled down at least 35 per cent." S. S. No. 5, Artemesia, is also sending a resolution to the C.E.A. along the same line; and that the Public School Inspector be not allowed to withhold the township grant on account of any salary below the minimum.

High taxation was the general theme throughout the meeting and Mr. Thos. Henry of Springhill clearly explained the boat we are in and said it was very hard to dance to the tune. While we paid for the fiddling we are not allowed to call the tune.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Geo. Cairns was re-elected president for the coming year, and Mr. R. W. Douglas was appointed Vice-President. Mr. Archie Stewart was elected 2nd Vice-President and Mr. Neil McCannel Secretary-Treasurer. Flesherton Advance.

## T. S. WRIGHT WRITES FROM WINNIPEG

To the Editor of The Markdale Standard, Markdale, Ont.

Dear Sir,—With your kind permission I would like to pen a few remarks in answer to an item in your issue of Jan. 12th which reported at some length a meeting sponsored by Miss Agnes Macphail, member for South-East Grey. It appears she has taken up the battle of the cause which came into existence in Alberta and in order to create some interest has included a couple of Wellingtons in the persons of F. Oliver and R. A. Dawson, as leaders. It is quite simple to understand the beat of their pulse.

Although I was born and raised on con. 10, Glenelg, I have never met any of those exalted political leaders of the East. Yet are they not only followers of the C. C. F.? Miss Macphail has been in our city (Winnipeg) more than once but I have never attended any of her gatherings. These gatherings always include some from Central Europe and some of the ex-convicts of the 1919 Winnipeg strike, an event which we shall never forget. One of their Western leaders and prominent workers is an ex-Metodist preacher, who was discharged from the church before union took place.

Mr. Editor, I claim to know something of the people of this province (Manitoba) having been a resident west of the Red River for over 40 years. We have a large number of people from Russia and the Central European countries and they certainly are no asset to us or to Canada, and it is this class of voter who sends Woodsworth to Ottawa. I am told that he gets assistance monthly from Soviet Russia and we all know he took a trip to that country about a year ago. These are the kind of people your leaders are associated with in the C. C. F. and their great uplift work. May God help you people in Grey County if you choose to follow their lead. There is not enough loyal blood in their veins to choke a rabbit. In a recent election in Alberta the same element united to defeat one of these Russian promoters.

I think I understand the position of many of your people, a great number of whom have never been 200 miles away from home and know nothing of the ways of the foreign elements. They are disloyal to our country and have gained such a foothold in the West that the Austrian anthem is sung in some of the schools in the morning. In some schools the children are not permitted to sing any of the good old British songs. At a school south of Regina a foreign flag waved for months until the Mounted Police cut it down. This is the kind of people to whom your leaders are looking for leadership and with whom they associate. Our city is full of them and the courts here are never free from them.

Most of you people know what has taken place here this winter. The Farmer-Labor government neglected to check the books of the University since they took office ten years ago and \$1,000,000 has been stolen. A County Court Judge, who lived up with his element, has been on trial for six weeks and it is likely he will be dismissed.

I could go on and give you many instances of the underhand methods of these foreign workers and their allies but will close for this time. Thanking you for your kindness and wishing you all success in your fight for British rule and British institutions, am
