

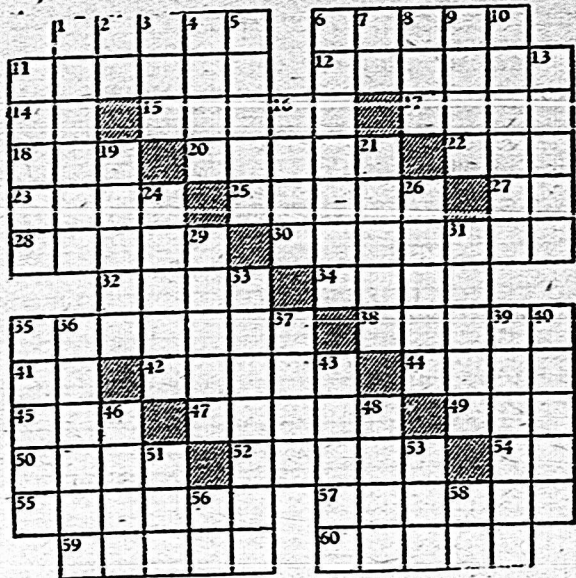

Household Spirit Rules

Russian Peasant Homes

Domovoj is well known in the households of peasant Russia. Each house there has a Domovoj, the good spirit, the protector. He would not be popular with real estate men because this superstition is so strong as to prevent families from moving from one house to another.
When a family moves into another home, they ask the Domovoj to accompany them, and in some localities the housewife carries hot coals to the new home from the old one, which is believed to urge the spirit to make the change. "Kansas City Star" says.
It is supposed that he dislikes morning, and in some districts it is believed the household god will cause the death of the head of the house if he builds a new domicile.
He is thought by Russians to be the spirit of an ancestor or founder of the family and to protect the family against the violence of other spirits and witches. He is credited with examining the kitchen floor at night to see if it has been well scrubbed by the housewife.
His good will is secured by leaving a part of the evening meal on the table and by placing gifts of dyed eggs on the roof.

Explorers To Fly To World's Top

Two British Expeditions Will Set Out This Year on Mt. Everest Adventure

London.—With preparations for two Mount Everest expeditions nearing completion, interest is growing in the possibility that the highest mountain in the world will at last be conquered. One is the flying expedition. The other will climb in the traditional way on foot.
Flying tests of the two airplanes purchased for the attempt to fly over the summit will begin soon and a mountaineering expedition is expected to leave for India at an early date.
The prime movers in the aerial attack are Lord Peel, chairman of the Everest flight committee; Air Commodore P. M. F. Fellowes, the leader of the expedition; Squadron Leader Lord Clydesdale, chief pilot; Lieutenant-Colonel L. V. S. Blacker, observer; Flight Lieutenant D. F. McIntyre, who will pilot the second plane, and Colonel P. T. Etherton, honorary organizing secretary.

Pelicans Are Technocrats, "Inventing" Cold Storage

The pelicans are said to be interested in technocracy. The machine age has brought them such a large measure of benefit that they have become thoroughly converted to the proposition of a little labor and a lot of luxury, says "The Christian Science Monitor."
The pelican is a wise old bird. As the holder of patents for the first known practical cold storage system it has led all other birds in the promotion of labor-saving devices. No bird has developed greater facilities for gathering and storing its food. And it has not been unmindful of the value of the inventions of man. Hence its interest in the cause of technocracy at a time when the economic situation has served somewhat to restrict its easy sources of food supply.
In early days the pelican employed such crude methods as diving for the fish which formed its chief source of food supply. And then, at various points, great fish canneries got into operation and ejected sufficient waste product to provide an easy living for vast colonies of pelicans.
Pelican youth grew up in an atmosphere of indulgence. The next meal meat only a short and pleasant flight to the nearest cannery. The machine age has removed the care of foraging when their parents dived and ducked ten hours or more a day for a bit of herring and often went to bed hungry. But now many canneries have been closed by economic conditions and the younger pelicans, untrained in the pursuits of their forefathers, are blaming the government for a shortage of food. Hence their return to technocracy.

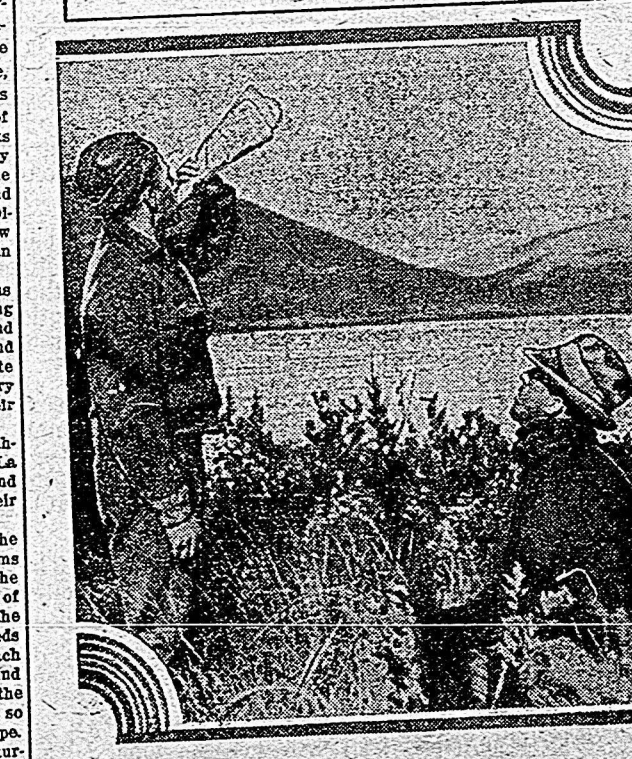

Famed Monks Transfer Monastery to Himalayas

In modern times there are fewer-foot travelers in the Alpine pass between Switzerland and Italy where the famous St. Bernard Hospice, founded nearly 1,000 years ago, has dispensed hospitality to thousands of wayfarers. Consequently, the monks and their great dogs, with time heavy on their hands, sought a new site for their services. They have found it, according to "The Literary Digest," and are establishing a new monastery in Tibet in the Himalayan highlands.
In 1930 two of their number, Canons Mellex and Coques, after visiting Lhasa, the Buddhist sacred city, and obtaining permits from the grand lama, explored the country for a site that promised opportunity to carry out a mission similar to that of their famous monastery in the Alps.
They found this site on the southern boundary of Tibet on the Si-La Pass, 13,789 feet above sea level and almost 6,000 feet higher than their Swiss mountain hospice.
Through this great break in the Himalayas pass thousands of pilgrims from India and the Far East to the Tibetan shrines, and thousands of traders from Central Asia to the plains of India. Here hundreds perish from the snow and cold each winter, and here the monks found opportunity to continue in Asia the lifesaving service they have for so many centuries carried on in Europe.
"There," says "The London Saturday Review," "neither train nor motor will defend those who take the Si-La Pass from the fury of the elements, and the dogs, if only they can make friends with their opposite numbers in Tibet, being the flask of brandy on their collars, will find lost travelers to rescue."
