Surviving are two daughters, Annie and Margaret, the latter married and living in Vancouver. Four sisters also survive, Mrs. Wm. J. Middleton of Berkeley; Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Nesbitt of Holland Centre, and Mrs. John Bowler of Goring.

Mrs. Crawford visited with her relatives in this locality last summer.

CUP PRESENTED

An interesting feature took place in Form Four of the Markdale Public School on Monday afternoon, when Mr. T. S. Cooper, local representative of the Department of Agriculture, presented the T. Eaton silver cup to Ruth Alton. This cup is given annually to the boy or girl securing the highest number of points at each school fair in Ontario, and Ruth was the successful pupil at the Markdale School Fair held last October. Mr. Cooper in presenting the cup, spoke to the pupils in a few well-chosen words, explaining their opportunities as presented by the present educational facilities and their duties to make the most of their advantages in order to become useful citizens. He impressed the fact that service to one's fellow men was the supreme object of life, not the gaining of mere material wealth.

On receiving the cup Ruth made a very suitable reply expressing her appreciation of the opportunities offered for development by having the chance to participate in School Fair activities.

Mr. Messenger then spoke a few words stating his appreciation of the co-operation of the Markdale Board of Trustees which made possible the participation of the pupils in the School Fair. He praised the pupils general high proficiency and the keen desire on the part of the majority to grasp all the educational advantages offered. He stated Ruth was an ambitious, enthusiastic pupil, performing her work faithfully and cheerfully. Ruth is to be congratulated on her industry and perseverance which enabled her to win the much coveted prize, the Eaton Cup. The enjoyable hour was brought to a close by the pupils singing, "O Canada."

WILLIAM MYERS

Markdale and vicinity lost one of its oldest and most highly esteemed residents on Thursday, March 9th, when Mr. William Myers passed away at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. Ben. Summers, in Markdale. Five years ago last August the deceased suffered a paralytic stroke and since that time has been an invalid. About a week previous to death he developed pneumonia which proved fatal.

The late William Myers was a resident of Euphrasia practically all his life, being a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Myers of that township. After his marriage 51 years ago to Mary S. Rodman he farmed on the eleventh line until incapacitated by a paralytic stroke. Since that time the family has spent the winter months in the village. He is survived by three daughters, namely: Mrs. Ben. Summers, Mrs. Amos McClung and Miss Vera, all in Markdale. Four brothers and one sister also survive, Joseph, Robert and George in Toronto and Foster in Euphrasia, and Miss Maria Myers in Toronto.

The late Mr. Myers was a member of Annesley United Church and was a man of sterling qualities. He held the respect of a wide circle of friends who deeply regret his passing.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery. Rev. H. S. Warren, his pastor, was assisted in the services by Rev. A. Mills. Mr. Warren took as his text, "Thy Grace is Sufficient." At the chapel in the cemetery the officiating was L.G.L. No. 1045, Markdale, of which the deceased had been a member for over 50 years, read the Orange burial service. The pallbearers were Messrs. John Hannah, J. T. Abercrombie, W. E. Bradey, Jas. Bradey, J. J. McFadden and A. E. Colgan.

The floral tributes included a pillow from the wife and family; a wreath from the Orange Lodge and a spray from the Rodman family.

J. R. MACINTYRE

John Richard Macintyre, editor and proprietor of The Dundalk Herald for the past 30 years, died on Tuesday of this week after a brief illness from heart trouble. Mr. Macintyre was born at Wallace-town and as a young man came to Markdale and was in the employ of Wm. Lucas & Co. here for a short time before going to Dundalk. He continued with the Lucas firm until he purchased The Herald about 50 years ago. Surviving are two daughters, Miss Dell, teacher at Primrose, and Mrs. M. C. Crawford in Shelburne, and one son, Frank, in Dundalk. The funeral takes place this Thursday afternoon.

SULLIVAN GOT WINNER

In reporting a hockey game between the White Stars of Detroit and Mic Macs of Windsor a Detroit paper makes this reference to Jimmy Sullivan formerly of Markdale: "Defeat came as a surprise to the Mic Macs.
