Poland Cuts Salaries

With the avowed aim of abolishing that still exist and, fortunately, there are many. Moreover, our forefathers would not be surprised at finding private and public enterprises have maintained during the indus trial crisis while the wages of manual workers have been reduced, a govern ment decree was issued in Warsaw some time ago making it legal to amend such contracts as are no longer justifiable in the present circun stances, and thus enabling undertak ings to reduce salaries without being required to pay excessive compensa-

It covers joint-stock and limited lia bility companies, co-operative socie-ties, insurance companies, industrial and commercial corporations, State municipal undertakings and social insurance institutions. In all State establishments, the pay of members of the managing staff, boards of directors and non-manual workers must be adapted to the earning capacity and economic position of the unlertaking concerned and the wage level of the whole of the staff employed in it.

The decree applies to all salaries fixed by contracts in force, or to be oncluded in the future, amounting to more than 2,500 zloty (about \$280) a manth. The term "remuneration" ignifies the total sum constituted by he salary proper and the variou The remuneration may Howances. be reduced either on the decision of the management of the undertaking r in virtue of a decision of the dis trict court.


