### GIVEN FOUR YEARS

Colin D. Nadeau, former accountant in the Bank of Montreal, pleaded guilty in police court at Collingwood on Friday to two charges, one of embezzlement of \$37,700 and another of forgery. Crown-Attorney F. A. Evans appeared for the Crown and W. A. Boys, K.C., for Nadeau. Character evidence was submitted by business firms of Collingwood. Nadeau was sentenced by Magistrate Hogg to four years in Portsmouth on each count, the sentences to run concurrently.

In the course of the trial it came out that Nadeau had voluntarily given information as to the money stolen and that he had made restitution to the extent of \$10,000. The forgery consisted of signing the manager's name to returns to head office.
