WATCH FOR BAD MONEY

Counterfeit coins of three kinds are in circulation in this district at the present time, and a general warning has been issued to merchants and business men to beware of the bad quarters, dimes and fifty-cent pieces. The half-dollars and quarters emanate from the same source. They are pure lead, easily distinguished from the genuine variety in that they are dull in color, and very noticeably lack the true ring of the mint-coined pieces. Of such poor material is their composition that one man who was victimized with two or three of the fifty-cent pieces found that when the spurious coin was placed on a hot stove it melted. The material does not seem much harder than solder. The dimes are somewhat different, and might deceive any but close observation. They are small coppers, dipped in some material to represent silver. The "one-cent" legend has first been filed off, and all that can be seen is the King's head, and the "Georgius Dei Gratia," etc.—Action Free Press.

WINNIPEG MAN WRITES AGAIN

To the Editor of The Markdale Standard:

Dear Sir,—Through your kindness I would like to pen a few remarks in reference to the weekly letters of Miss Agnes C. Marshall, member for South-East Grey, which are running in your paper. I read with interest the life history of Mr. J. S. Woodsworth of Winnipeg North Centre and was quite surprised to find such a complete story of his life. I knew Mr. Woodsworth's parents years ago and I have known him for a great many years. He was assistant pastor of Grace Methodist Church and I was an usher in the same church at the time. We detected that he was drifting from the doctrines of the church and the authorities placed him in charge of a foreign mission in the city. A little later the Norris Government (Liberal) placed him in charge of social service work in the province. One night while seated in the gallery while the House was in session he was observed applauding the Anti-British remarks of a socialist speaker and the next day he was discharged.

He then went to Alberta where he took charge of a mission but not for long. He then worked at the docks in Vancouver for nearly a year when he went to Edmonton as an organizer for the Labor party. While the big strike of 1919 was in progress he landed in Winnipeg. During this strike we were without street cars from the 15th of May to the first of July and for four weeks and four days not a letter was delivered to our house. When Mr. Woodsworth left the train in Winnipeg in the evening he carried a large bundle of grey blankets. I met him crossing the street about a mile from the station and he dropped his bundle to the street. He asked me some questions about the strike but my answers were not pleasing to him so he again shouldered his bundle and passed on.

Three or four days later, as a disturber of the peace, he was arrested in the city hall and was taken to the penitentiary as the police cells were not safe for agitators at that time. After some days he secured bail. A companion, Fred Dixon, was arrested at the same time and after trial was released and Mr. Woodsworth was also discharged. Since that time Mr. Woodsworth has never been accused of being loyal to British principles.

This is the man who is head of the C. C. F. movement which started in Alberta and travelled East. The member for South-East Grey is a follower of this man and they would take charge of the affairs of the Dominion if the people were foolish enough to allow such a thing to happen. God help us if such a thing should take place.

Early this winter Mr. Woodsworth held a big meeting in a large theatre here. A later meeting was not well attended, as the people had found out what he advocated.

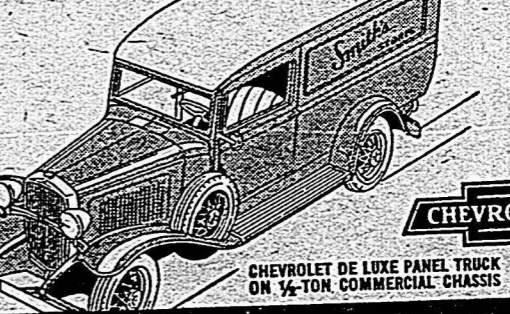
