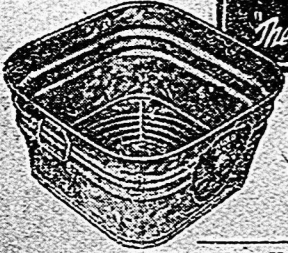

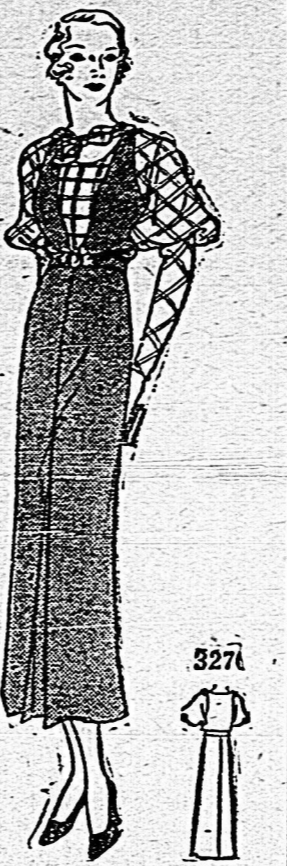
And then there was the announcement that she was missing from her home at Hampstead! Molly's brain usually calm and equal to most of life's emergencies—began to swim.

Teaching the Blind to Read
 It is noteworthy that the first efforts to enable the blind to read began in 1617, just 6 years after the King James version of the Bible was first published.
 Various systems of raised letters were used. Progress was slow at first. In 1822 the Gospel of St. John was published in a system of raised Roman letters and by 1840 the Bible was completed in that system.
 Braille, the system finally adopted and at present universally in use, was invented by a blind musician of France, named Louis Braille. This dotted system, which may be written as well as read by the blind, is now completely printed in universal Braille and is distributed by the Braille Bible Society, Incorporated of Los Angeles. It is comprised of 21 volumes, and although costing \$8 a volume to produce, is distributed at the price of \$1 per volume.
Birmingham Shows Low Cost of Education
 Birmingham, Ala.—Cost of education of a pupil in the public schools of Birmingham for the session 1931-32 was lowest in a table of 65 cities in the country, according to statistics received from the office of education.
 For the 1931-32 session pupils were educated in the Birmingham schools, according to the department's table, at an average of \$54.79 each. This was a decrease of 15.4 per cent. from the figures for the 1929-30 session, when Birmingham was next to lowest with an average cost of \$64.75 a pupil. That year Norfolk, Va., was lowest with an average cost of \$63.06 a pupil. For the 1931-32 session, Norfolk's average was \$55.35.
 Birmingham, in addition to ranking lowest in cost, was third in reduction of cost from 1929-30 to 1931-32, with a decrease of 15.4 per cent. Fall River, Mass., showed greatest decrease, 23.8 per cent. and Akron, O., was second with a decrease of 21.35 per cent. Yonkers, N.Y., has the highest average, \$106.97 a pupil, for 1931-32.
