



Various systems of raised letters were used. Progress was slow at first. In 1832 the Gospel of St. John was published in a system of raised Roman letters and by 1840 the Bible was comleted in that system.

Braille, the system finally adopted and at present universally in use, was invented by a blind musician of France, named Louis Braille. This dotted system, which may be written as well as read by the blind, is now completely printed in universal Braille and is distributed by the Braille Bible Society Incorporated of Los Angeles. It is comprised of 21 volumes, and alhough costing \$\$ a volume to produce is distributed at the price of \$1 per roluma.

Birmingham Shows Low Cost of Education

Binrmingham, Ala.—Cost of education of a pupil in the public schools of Birmingham for the session 1931-32 was lowest in a table of 65 cities in the country, according to statis-tics received from the office of edu-

For the 1931-32 session pupils were educated in the Birmingham schools ccording to the department's table f: an average of \$54.79 each. This was a decrease of 15.4 per cent. from the figures for the 1929-30 session when Birmingham was next to lowes with an average cost of \$64.75 a pupil. That year Norfolk, Va., was low cst with an average cost of \$63.06 a pupil. For the 1931-22 session, Norfolk's average w. \$55.35.


