LIFTING THE STEEL

The C.P.R. track from Melville Junction to Bolton is being removed and the following has been contributed by one of the workmen on the job:

"Operations in the lifting of the steel have been underway for the past three weeks and several miles of track have already been taken up."

"A large C.P.R. work train, including a crane for lifting the steel rails and bridges and flat cars for conveying rails, ties and scrap material, is on the job."

"Approximately 60 men are employed under the supervision of Mr. Dan Murdoch of Markdale and Mr. Alf Harrington of Woodbridge. Mr. Murdoch with his men are working ahead of the train, taking out every other tie, pulling spikes and uncoupling rails. The material is gathered on small flat cars and put into piles to be loaded on the work train."

"The track is left with rails just coupled together so the train can pass over the skeleton track and pick up the steel by means of a huge crane run by its own power. Approximately 100 tons of steel rails, three to four car loads of ties and several tons of scrap material are loaded daily. From one-half to three-quarters of a mile of track is cleared of steel and ties every day."

"Steel bridges are taken down and loaded on flat cars by the crane. All cars loaded are taken to the C. P.R. yards in Toronto. Operations at time of writing are in progress on the Caledon Mountain."

"For taking out the bolts we have a 5-ton air compressor with two guns attached to 40 feet of hose. It takes two men to each gun. W. Quirley of Orangeville and J. D. Murdoch of Durham operate one gun and W. May of Orangeville and W. Smith of Chatsworth operate the other. It takes about one minute to a joint of four bolts. We also have a spike puller operated by a small gasoline engine. It pulls about a mile in eight hours."




