## LIFTING THE STEEL

Junction to Bolton is being removed and the following has been contributed by one of the workmen on the

"Operations in the lifting of the steel have been underway for the past three weeks and several miles of track have already been taken up "A large C.P.R. work train, including a crane for lifting the steel rails and bridges and flat cars for conveying rails, ties and scrap ma

terial, is on the job. "Approximately 60 men are em ployed under the supervision of Mr Dan Murdock of Markdale and Mr Alf. Harrington of Woodbridge. Mr. Murdock with his men are working ahead of the train, taking out ever other tie, pulling spikes and un coupling rails. The material is gath ered on small flat cars and put into piles to be loaded on the work train

"The track is left with rails jus coupled together so the train can pass over the skeleton track and pick up the steel by means of a huge rane run by its own power. Approx imately 100 tons of steel rails, three to four car loads of ties and several tons of scrap material are loaded From one-half to three marters of a mile of track is cleared of steel and ties every day.

"Steel bridges are taken down an loaded on flat cars by the crane All cars loaded are taken to the C P.R. yards in Toronto. Operation at time of writing are in progres on the Caledon Mountain.

"For taking out the bolts we have 5-ton air compressor with two guns attached to 40 feet of hose. It takes two men to each gun. W. Quirley of Orangeville and J. D. Murdock of Durham operate one oun and W May of Orangeville and W. Smith of Chatsworth operate the ther. It takes about one minute to ioint of four holts. We also have a spike puller operated by a small asoline engine. It pulls about nile in eight hours.'
