DR. ANGUS EGO

Dr. Angus Ego, for many years a prominent physician of Markdale, passed away in Owen Sound on Saturday morning following an illness of several years. About nine years ago he suffered a stroke but recovered sufficiently to continue his practice for several months when a second stroke so incapacitated him that he had since been confined to his home. Some time later he and Mrs. Ego went to Owen Sound to reside with their daughter, Mrs. R. C. McKnight. A third stroke caused his death on Saturday.

Dr. Angus Ego was born at Udora, near Sutton, on July 2nd, 1860, a son of the late Angus and Eliza Ego. After finishing his studies he taught school for some time before attending the School of Medicine at Toronto University where he obtained his degree and was gold medalist in his class.

For one year after graduating he practiced at Tottenham and then came to Markdale as a partner of the late Dr. T. S. Sproule. After the partnership was dissolved the deceased continued his practice here until illness compelled him to retire. He was a good citizen and was popular with all classes in the community. For several years he was a member of the Public School Board and was secretary-treasurer. He was a staunch Conservative and in the 1923 contested Centre Grey in the Provincial election.

In 1893 he married Bessie L. Buchanan, who with one daughter, Mrs. R. C. McKnight, survives. He was for several years an active member of the Odd Fellows' and Orange Lodges here. Many friends here and in the locality regret exceedingly his passing.

The funeral service was held at the home of Mr. R. C. McKnight in Owen Sound on Sunday and was attended by many from the village and vicinity. Rev. E. W. Jewitt, of Division Street United Church had charge of the service. The remains were taken to the home of Mr. Theron Buchanan in Galt on Monday morning and interment made in Galt cemetery that afternoon. Rev. Hall of Knox Presbyterian Church, Galt, officiated at the graveside. The pallbearers were Messrs. R. C. McKnight, of Owen Sound, Donald Ego of Sutton West, Gordon Ego of Peterboro, H. H. Lucas, Thos. Tuck and Dr. L. G. Campbell of Markdale.

## GEORGE W. KENNY

Passing peacefully away in sleep on Wednesday morning, May 24th, the death of George Willoughby Kenny, Thornbury, came as a release from the ordeal of pain, caused by a heart affliction, which this well-known and esteemed resident endured since last December. Deceased, who was in his 58th year, was born in Euphrasia township the only son of the late Charles and Mrs. Kenny.

Mr. Kenny lived practically his whole life on the farm on which he was born in Euphrasia township. A son, Fred, now operates the farm. On June 1st, 1893, the subject of this sketch was married to Miss Margaret Grant, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Grant, and to this happy union were born two girls and two boys, namely: Edna (Mrs. Clifford Hewgill), Aida (Mrs. Stewart Falls), Louis in Thornbury and Fred on the home farm. These children along with the sorrowing wife are left to mourn Mr. Kenny's demise.

Mr. Kenny was a most likeable man, his genial personality, his willingness to assist in any good cause, as well as his valued citizenship, were only a few of the attributes one might say he possessed.

The funeral took place Friday to Union Cemetery at Thornbury, following a service in St. George's Church, Clarksburg. Rev. H. K. L. Charlton, the rector, had charge of the obsequies. Thornbury Review-Herald.

## REV. A. J. SAVAGE

Rev. Father Arthur John Savage, a former pastor in charge of St. Joseph's Church, Markdale, and St. John's Church, Glenora, passed away at the home of his sister in Brantford on Monday, May 22nd. Since leaving Markdale about 25 years ago he had been in charge of the Oakville parish. Ill health compelled him to retire last winter. Interment was made at Brantford on Wednesday.

## MRS. WM. H. FOSTER

Friends here were shocked on Sunday when the news came that Mrs. Wm. H. Foster had died that day at her home in Guelph. She had been in failing health for some months but it was not thought that the end was near. The remains were brought to Markdale on Tuesday and interred in the family plot here following a service in Annesley Church, where the deceased had been an active worker during the years she lived in the village.

The late Mrs. Foster was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Heath and spent practically all her life in this locality, moving to Guelph a few years ago. She is survived by her husband and one son along with one brother, Mr. William Heath, on the township, Euphrasia and Artemesia, and two sisters, Mrs. W. H. Sewell and Miss Ethel Heath, who has been with her sister in Guelph for some months. A fuller obituary will appear next week.

## MRS. ROBERT NIXON

There passed away at her home in the Township North vicinity on Monday last, Mrs. Robert Nixon, after an illness of five weeks' duration. She had been ill with pneumonia, and relatives hoped for her recovery until Thursday last when hemorrhages of the heart hastened the end. She was in her 77th year.

The late Mrs. Nixon was born in Essa Township near Cookstown, one of a large family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Henning, pioneers of Euphrasia township. Mr. Henning died 19 years ago at the ripe old age of 103 years. At the age of 14 years, the subject of this sketch moved with her parents to Beaverdale community in Euphrasia township, at which time she was sparsely settled. 53 years ago she was married to Mr. Robert Nixon and for 20 years they resided at Temple Hill. In 1900 they moved to the Charles McGuire homestead, the farm now occupied by Mr. G. Phipps. Here Mr. Nixon died 18 years ago.

Mrs. Nixon's passing will be regretted by a wide circle of relatives who held her in the highest esteem for her sterling traits and neighborly qualities. She is survived by eight children, 15 grandchildren and one great grandchild. The children are Mrs. M. Hastings, of Stratford; Jack of Oakva, Sask.; Mrs. Joseph Abbott, Thornbury; Robt. and Will at home, Mrs. W. Dinsmore, Thornbury, Miss Laura at home, Mrs. E. Johnston of Walters Falls. Two sisters and two brothers also mourn her demise, Mrs. R. Ferris, Thornbury, Mrs. A. Ormsby, Meaford, Alex. Henning of Meaford and Sam Henning of Proton.

St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in Thornbury was crowded on Wednesday afternoon for the obsequies conducted by her pastor, Rev. E. Orsborn. After the service, interment took place in Union Cemetery. Thornbury Review-Herald.
