A very sad gloom was cast over this community on Friday evening, May 19th, at 7.30 o'clock, when the news flashed about that another life, that of Mrs. Jacob Williams, had passed away to be with her Saviour. Her maiden name was Miss Elizabeth Stewart, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Stewart. She was born 60 years ago last April on the Toronto line, near Flesherston, where she spent her girlhood days.
