PLOWING MATCH

The Provincial Plowing Match, to be held in Derby township on October 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th, will be one of the biggest events ever held in Grey County. The farms on which the match is to take place are located about two miles west of the highway between Chatsworth and Owen Sound. Signs will be erected giving directions as to roads used for entering and leaving.

Large exhibits of farm machinery, etc. will be made. Lunch counters and dining rooms will be erected so that visitors will be able to procure meals on the grounds. Cash prizes amounting to \$300 are offered on the value of the plowing.

Demonstrations will be conducted in order that those intending to compete may have an opportunity for instruction, previous to the big event. At 9.30 a.m. on Wednesday, September 27th, a demonstration will be held at R. C. Robinson's, con. 2, E.G.R., in Glenelg, and at 1.30 the same afternoon at John McCarthy's, con. 10, Glenelg, in Artemesia on the same day. On Friday, September 29th, a demonstration will be held at Ernest Stinson's, near Proton Station, at 9.30 a.m. and at J. W. Davis's, on the East Backline, at 1.30 o'clock. In Euphrasia the demonstration will be held at Rocklyn all day on Friday, September 28th. The Holland's demonstration will be held on Saturday, September 30th, the first at R. S. Lee's, con. 2, E.G.R., at 9.30 a.m., and at 1.30 in the afternoon at Wilmer Clark's, con. 10.

Intending contestants should bring team and plow to these demonstrations.
