## MRS. ANDREW LOVE

On Wednesday, November 15th, Mrs. Andrew Love, an aged and highly respected resident of this locality, passed away at the home of her son-in-law, Mr. John Wilson.

Mrs. Love, who was in her 85th year, had been in failing health since last spring and during the past two months had been confined to her bed, death being due to the infirmities of age.

Mrs. Love was born in Ireland, the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Walker.

At the age of 12 years she came with the family to Canada. For some years they lived in Montreal, but later moved to Grey county and took up land in Holland township.

At the age of 22 she married Mr. Andrew Love and they took up housekeeping at the family homestead in East Spring, known ever since as the Love homestead. Here they farmed successfully and retired in 1909 to Markdale.

In 1931 they celebrated the 50th anniversary of their marriage. Mr. Love passed away on January 2nd, 1932. About five and a half years ago Mrs. Love closed her home in the village and went to live with her daughter, Mrs. John Wilson.

She was a woman of the Christian character, always interested in the higher and better things of life. She was for many years a member of the former Methodist church here, now Annesley United.

Of a family of three sons and six daughters all but one daughter survive, namely: John at Zeelandia, Sask.; Andrew at Wainwright, Alberta; William on the homestead; Mrs. J. J. Whyte in Markdale; Mrs. John Cook in Regina, Sask.; and Mrs. Stephen Bennett, Mrs. John Wilson and Mrs. A. McFadden in this locality.

The eldest daughter, Mrs. Wm. Brodie, passed away at Saskatoon nearly three years ago. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon at Markdale cemetery. Rev. H. S. Warren was assisted in the service at the house and grave by Rev. Albert Mills. The pallbearers were Messrs. Stephen Bennett, John Wilson and J. McFadden. J. J. Whyte, John Love and Robt. Torry.
