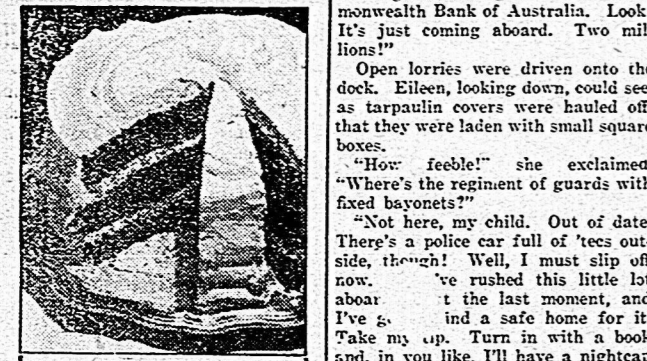
YUANHEE SEE LAUGHS

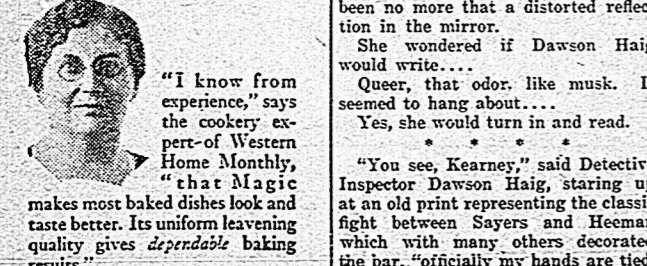

"Provincial Days" At Royal Winter Fair

"Provincial Days" at the Royal Winter Fair are being featured again this year as in the past, according to the President, Col. Harry McGehe, because it is felt that one valuable aspect of the Fair, in addition to promoting the more immediate needs of Canadian agriculture, is the education of the nation of national unity. The first day has been designated "Canadian Day" for this special purpose. On that day the broad national aspects of Canadian agriculture are brought out and its unifying national influence made as plain as possible. The succeeding days are dedicated to each of the provinces, combining the three Maritime provinces into one. This year the order will be:—

Canadian Day—Wednesday, November 22nd.
British Columbia Day—Thursday, November 23rd.
Maritime Day—Friday, November 24th.
Quebec Day—Saturday, November 25th.
Alberta Day—Monday, November 27th.
Manitoba Day—Tuesday, November 28th.
Saskatchewan Day—Wednesday, November 29th.
Ontario Day—Thursday, November 30th.

Ontario School Situation Subject of Survey
