### TALKED OF SCHOOLS **PUBLIC AND SEPARATE**

A meeting, sponsored by the County Orange Lodge of East Grev and held in Reburn's Hall on Friday evening of last week, was well attended, every available seat being occupied. Mr. Herb. Corbett, County Master of East Grey, occupied the chair and on the platform slong with a him, were several prominent citizens including three of the local clergymen as well as the Reeves of several municipalities. The speakers were Mr. Geo. McCombe and Mr. L. if H. Saunders of Toronto, the farmer Deputy Grand Master of Ontarlo and the latter a Past Grand Master, and the latter a Past Grand Master, and Mr. W. J. Miller of Dognor, Associate Deputy Grand Master.

The meeting was opened by sing ing the National Anthem, after which ing the National Anthem, after which the chalirman introduced Mr. Mc-Combe, who, in his address, made a very favorable impression with the audience. He dealt chiefly with the Public School System of Ontario. He runic school system of Untario. He traced the progress of education from the beginning in 1785, when the first school was established at Kingston by John Stewart, a leader in the Angilcan church. A second school was opened in Niegara in 1792. The first act providing for education was passed by the sovern-1792. The first act providing for education was passed by the government of Upper Canada in 1807 and several changes and amendments were made before the final settlement in 1863. In 1840 an act was passed providing for separate Roman Catholic schools and Protestant schools. This was repealed in 1843.

Ontario members gave a majority of Ontario members gave a majority of 10 against the separate school clause. More than 40 amendments have since been passed by the Ontario Legislature granting further privileges to Roman Catholics. The Roman Catholics are now asking for a division of the taxes of incorporated companies and authlic utilities. ted companies and public utilities ated companies and public utilities on a basis of school population, regardless as to ownership of stock in such companies. Roman Catholics may designate to which system they pay taxes but Protestants must contribute to Public Schools, which are not Protestant: The Church and State in Outario are senarated and as not Protestant: The Church and state in Ontario are separated and as all public utilities are state owned the school taxes from such should go to the State owned schools and not to the schools of the R. C. Church. Comparisons with the Quebec system are not possible as the School System there is the Church System and not what we know as System and not what we know as public schools. Public schools must rovide for education of all children provide for education of all children but, separate schools are established crly, where it is desired by Roman Catholics. The Public Schools are for all classes, creeds and sects and should therefore be the only system to receive consideration from the
