# TEA TIME TALK

On January 6th at Tarpon Springs on the west coast, thousands of Greeks from all sections of the country participated in a colorfur religious pageant marking the Feast of the Epiphany. Thousands of spectators witnessed the ancient rituals which were climaxed by casting a golden cross into Spring Bayou and a contest among youthful divers to retrieve it. The celebration opened with services in St. Nicholas' church where Archbishop Athenagoras, head of the Greek Orthodox Church in North and South America, officiates. The Feast of Epiphany is in keeping with a custom established centuries ago in the Aegean Islands. When sponge fishermen migrated from Greece to Tarpon Springs in 1905 the first celebration of this kind was held in America. Year after year the Greek of the high points of amusement was epectators witnessed the ancient rituals which were climaxed by casting a golden cross into Spring Bayou and a contest among youthful divers to retrieve it. The celebration opened with services in St. Nicholas' church where Archbishop Athenagoras, head of the Greek Orthodox Church in North and South America, officiates. The Feast of Epiphany is in keeping with a custom established centuries ago in the Agean Islands. When sponge fishermen migrated from Greece to Tarpon Springs in 1905 the first celebration of this kind was held in America. Year after year the Greek colonists have enlarged the Pageant till now it ranks among the most important religious celebrations in the western hemisphere. Church rites filled the morning hours till noon-day when the great procession wended its way to the bayou where swarthy divers from the local sponge fleet sought the coveted token and received the Archbishop's blessing. About 10,000 guests swarmed the streets, about half of that number being tourists who were interested in these strange holy rites.

The first week of January the "Tin Can Tourists" of the world held their annual home-coming. A record number of tin-canners were present this year and words fail to describe the gay, sociable hours spent upon these grounds.
