GREY PRESBYTERY

Grey Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Annesley Church, Markdale, on Tuesday of last week when there were three sessions lasting until 11 p.m. The Chairman, Rev. Sidney Martin, M. A., of Meaford presided and there was a large representation of members present from all the Pastoral Charges.

The feature of the morning session was the devotional address by Rev. W. H. Smith, B.A., of Durham on the subject, "Listen to Your Own Conscience." It was a heart-searching deliverance to ministers, Sunday School teachers, and others engaged in religious work, that they take to themselves, and apply to their private lives, all that they recommend or preach to others. The address which prevailed at the close of the address was the most eloquent testimony to its worth.

Applications for superannuation were presented by Rev. A. McNeill of Maxwell and Rev. J. R. Wilkinson of Temple Hill, the former on account of ill health, the latter because of years of service rendered. Rev. Thomas Snowdon spoke kindly words to these brethren who have so loyally served the church, and wishing them well during their future lives.

The Non-Ministerial Representatives of the Charges organized themselves as an association affiliated with the Conference organization, and their first officers were: Mr. John McQuaker of Owen Sound as Chairman, Mr. William Martin of Sydenham as Vice-Chairman and Mr. T. W. Findlay of Meaford as Secretary.

The afternoon session opened with an address by Mrs. E. C. Murray of Fiesherston, who delivered a gracious and tactful message in regard to the work of the Women's Missionary Society, of which organization she has the honorable position of President of the Grey Presbytery.

Rev. Sidney Martin, M.A., of Meaford, and Mr. John McQuaker of Owen Sound received the nominations as Commissioners to the General Council of the Church, which is to meet in Kingston in September; Rev. T. F. Heaney, B.A., and Mr. M. E. Peacock of Meaford were nominated as alternates. Rev. E. W. Jewett, B.A., of Owen Sound, and Mr. John McQuaker were nominated as members of the Toronto Conference for the Conference year.

It was decided that the allocations to the charges for Presbytery and Conference Fund be at the rate of 12 cents per resident member for the coming year, and that the mileage allowance be at the rate of 5 cents per mile one way. The necessary arrangements for the election of a Non-Ministerial Representative to Conference, and the placing of ministers and laymen on the committees of Conference were made, and all these representatives are to receive notice of their appointment when arrangements are completed.

It was a matter of great satisfaction to the Presbytery to have the pleasure of recommending Mr. W. M. B. Metcalfe, B.A., B.D., to the Conference for ordination as a minister of the United Church. Mr. Metcalfe, who is a son of Mr. James Metcalfe of Hanover, who is himself a member of the Presbytery, has just completed his college work with great credit to himself, and was present to give a short account of his religious experience and call to the ministry. Rev. A. L. Atton, B. A., of Owen Sound made several very interesting references to the grandparents of the candidate for ordination; the grandfather had been a very acceptable local preacher in the days lang syne.

A good deal of time was spent in the consideration of the report of the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service. As finally adopted the report read as follows: 1. That the Presbytery urges upon the people within the care of our Church the Christian duty of supporting those candidates most likely to oppose the proclamation of the present Beer and Wine legislation, and to oppose any other tendency to widen the facilities for beverage liquors.

2. That Presbytery deprecates the action of the Senate in the advocacy of sweepstakes. We urge upon the members of the House of Commons

AN OPEN LETTER

To the Editor of The Standard

Dear Sir—On reading the article, "Palestine" not for Jews in Owen Sound Daily Sun-Times of May 8th by Stephen A. Haboush, and also attending the entertainment given by him in Annesley United Church, Markdale, on the evening of the same date, a strongly expressed opinion against his attitude towards Jewish people, I think that Mr. Haboush is untruthful and unfair towards Jewish people and towards the British Government. He is also misinterpreting Christianity.

He claims that the Jewish people have no rights to Palestine, which I claim is not true. He claims that the British Government has no right to allow Jewish people to establish in Palestine, which I also claim is not true, as Palestine is considered a colony of the British Empire. He points out that the Jewish people are a menace to Palestine which is untrue, and that the Jewish people are improved with modern conveniences such as electricity, railways, water systems and sanitation, but he does not give the Jewish people any credit for their improvements. He says that the engineers or for the millions of dollars in money that are being sent by the Jewish people from all over the world for the welfare and improvement of that land.

During the short time that I was at the entertainment I noticed that he had shown pictures of Jewish people in Palestine, and at the same time pointing to the pictures, made the following remarks: "These people were and are trying to destroy the Christian Religion." This is an absolute lie. I ask the readers to kindly think back about one year when Rabbi Eisendrath was on the same platform speaking and let them judge if the Rabbi was trying to destroy their Christian Religion, or if this so called Mr. Haboush, who is supposed to be a Galilean (for which we have no proof), is trying to destroy the Jewish Religion.

Mr. Haboush claims that the Jewish people are improving Palestine for their own selfishness. I might ask him if the Arabs, who lived in that land before there were a large number of Jewish people there—the Arabs living under squalid and filthy conditions—are they not benefiting by the improvements of that land—are they not benefiting by the employment that they get through the Jewish people as versus the practical slavery before that time—and are they not benefiting by the use of hospitals and schools from which they are not barred by the Jewish people.

Hoping that the people of the United Church will not take offence at my writing as I do not blame them for the sort of entertainment given. I feel sure that they, as well as myself, felt that they were going to listen to a description of the Holy Land, which is so much talked of, and not to a propagandist.
