Artemesia Council met in the Town Hall at Flesherston on May 7 with the members all present and the Reeve presiding.

A letter was read from the Deputy Minister of Agriculture regarding subsidies for seed grain. A draft by-law was also enclosed.

No action was taken. A Development Board re the taxes on lots 79 and 80, con. 3, S. D. R.

An account from Ray McLean for supplies for an indigent family, amounting to \$11.03, was presented and ordered to be paid.

By-Law No. 952, providing for a reduction of the term of subsisting contracts for the supply of electric services in Rural Power Districts, of which the Township or any portion thereof forms a part, from twenty years to five years, was introduced and passed.

The sum of \$1125.00 was appropriated to be expended in maintenance of roads during 1934, namely: Div. 1, \$250; Div. 2, \$250; Div. 3, \$250; Div. 4, \$250; Valley Road, \$125.

Mrs. E. Genoe was refunded 65 cents, being an error in taxes of 1933.

The County Treasurer was instructed to credit the following amounts as paid on arrears of taxes: Burt Taylor, \$4.20; Beaver Valley Fishing Club, \$4.16; L. Sheardown, \$7.15; John Graham, \$9.24; Ceylon L.O.L., \$7.20; W. G. Cockburn, \$96.50; Annie Wright, \$40; G. Whyte, \$35.43 and \$9.82; C. McMillan, \$35.67; H. Thompson, \$35.33; J. W. McMillan, \$20.00; J. J. Pattison, \$132.85; H. McLean, \$40.40.

It was resolved that the by-law providing for enclosing dogs during the night be rigidly enforced.

The Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and the Clerk were appointed an Assessment Committee for 1934.

The first sitting of the Court of Revision on the Assessment Roll for 1934 will be held at the Council Chambers on the 4th of June next at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

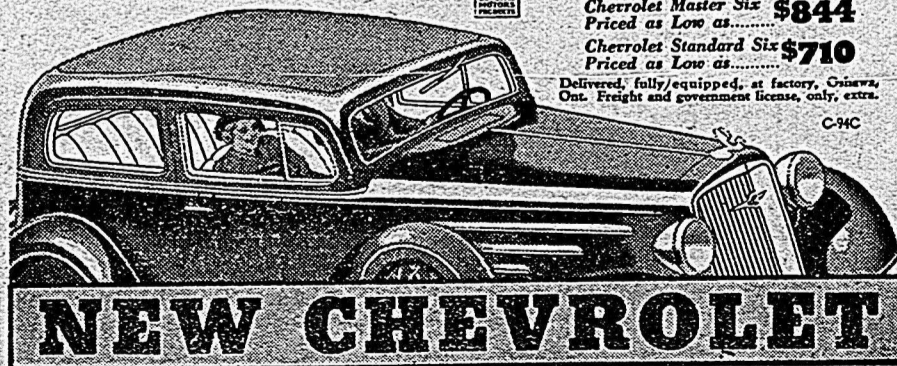
