

I have advocated a clean up of the Packers' racket and a lessening of charges at the Union Stock Yards. I worked faithfully on the Agricultural committee in the interests of the farmer as was made clear by special mention being made of me in the report of the Legislature on these matters to the Stevens Committee.

This last session I introduced the Debtors' Equity Bill which sought to protect the debt burdened householder and farmer in proportion to his equity in the property.

Two years ago I introduced a resolution advocating increased trade with Great Britain, forcing the question to a vote in the Legislature.
