## Markdale High School Special Commercial Course

Students to be eligible for this course should have completed two years at High School (or one year in Fifth Class of Public School and one year at High School) and have standing in the following Lower School subjects: English Literature and Composition, British History, Geography, Algebra, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Physiography and Geometry.

The subjects of the Commercial Course are as follows:

1. English Literature and Composition, including Business Correspondence.
2. Canadian History and Civics (for those who have not already taken this subject).
3. Oral Arithmetic and Rapid Calculation.
4. Book-keeping, Penmanship and Spelling.
5. Office Practice, Business Forms and Business Law.
6. Typewriting and Shorthand.

All students of the third, fourth or fifth years may take any or all of the subjects of the Commercial Course (where they do not conflict with other subjects they desire to take).

Under certain conditions students of the second year may take part of the Commercial Work and complete the course at the end of the third year.

Students who have only High School Entrance standing, who are looking forward to a Commercial Course, should take the regular course in Form I. They may take part of the commercial work during the second year and complete the course at the end of the third year.

**PHYSICAL EDUCATION IS COMPULSORY** for all students attending High School.

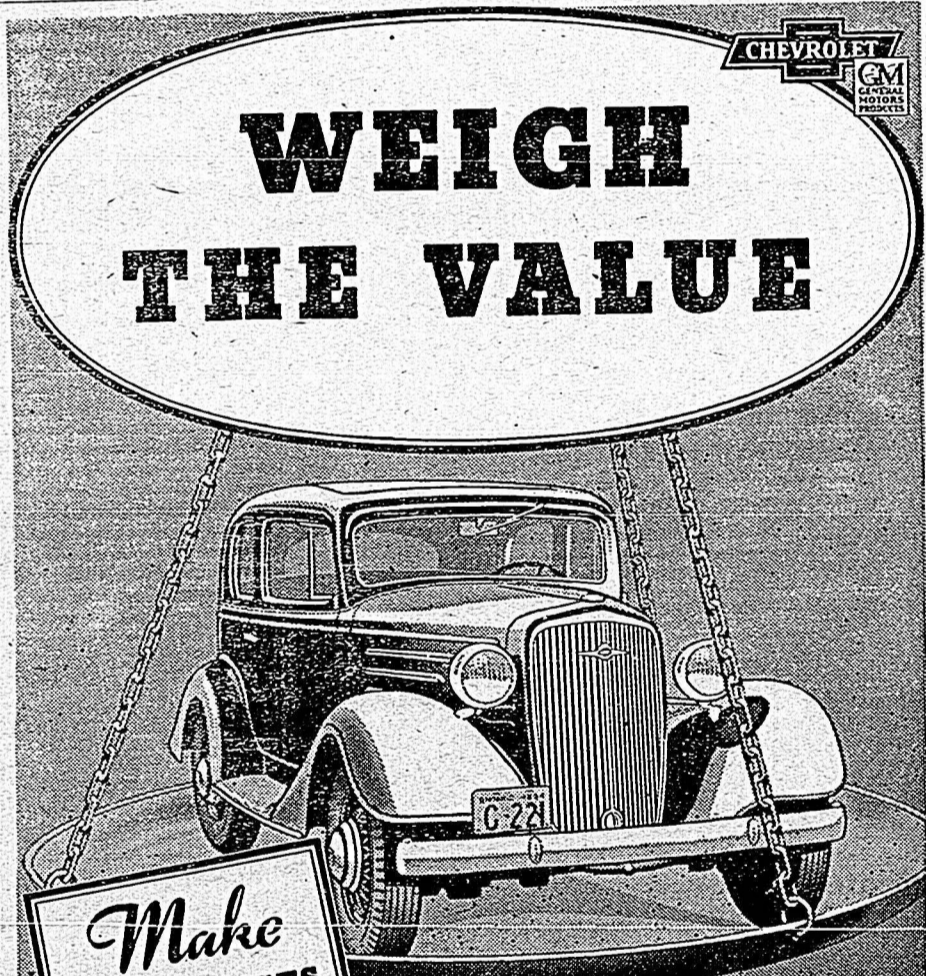
