EDITORIAL

The new Premier of Ontario, Hon. M. F. Heppburn, has attracted considerable public attention since taking office a couple of weeks ago because of the fact that he has dispensed with the services of several high-salaried officials of the Government and Hydro Commission. We are not assuming to be critical of our new Premier. Others have already done so. Since Mr. Heppburn has seen fit to reduce the pay of some officials why did he not have the courage to place salaries of all Government employees at the same standard as they were in 1914 when conditions generally throughout the Province were better than they are to-day? There is no doubt in the minds of the people of Ontario that too much has been paid for the services rendered and a great many are in the belief that the new standard continues the same evil. Sir James Whitney was one of Ontario's best Premiers and the standard of his time is surely sufficient for present day needs.

Mr. D. J. Taylor, recently re-elected as member of the Legislature representing North Grey, has been appointed Deputy Minister of Game and Fisheries and has resigned his seat. An election is now necessary and there is quite a scramble amongst the Liberals and Progressives for the nomination. It is a sure thing for a candidate who has the backing of the two parties but there is a possibility that trouble may arise in choosing a man to represent both sections. The Conservatives will likely put a man in the field and if it is a three-cornered fight there is no telling what might happen. The Liberals have stood aside for the Progressives for several years and now many of their supporters think it is their turn at the bat. Among them be it.

Agitators in Ontario, chiefly in the larger centres, are endeavouring to stage what they call a "Hunger March," with the pretense of interviewing the Ontario Government asking for relief. Our opinion is that the affair is being staged to spread communistic ideas and propaganda. There is no person starving to death in Ontario and the organizers of the march appear to be well supplied with capital as trucks are being engaged to carry the delegates from outside points to Toronto. Agitators are in clover during the present depression and they are taking full advantage of the opportunity. Their chief business is to make a living at the expense of those whom they pretend to protect and advise.

Crops are excellent throughout the County of Grey and more than once during the past few weeks have we heard the expression that we surely are living in the Garden of Eden. Prospects are bright for the future in this particular locality.

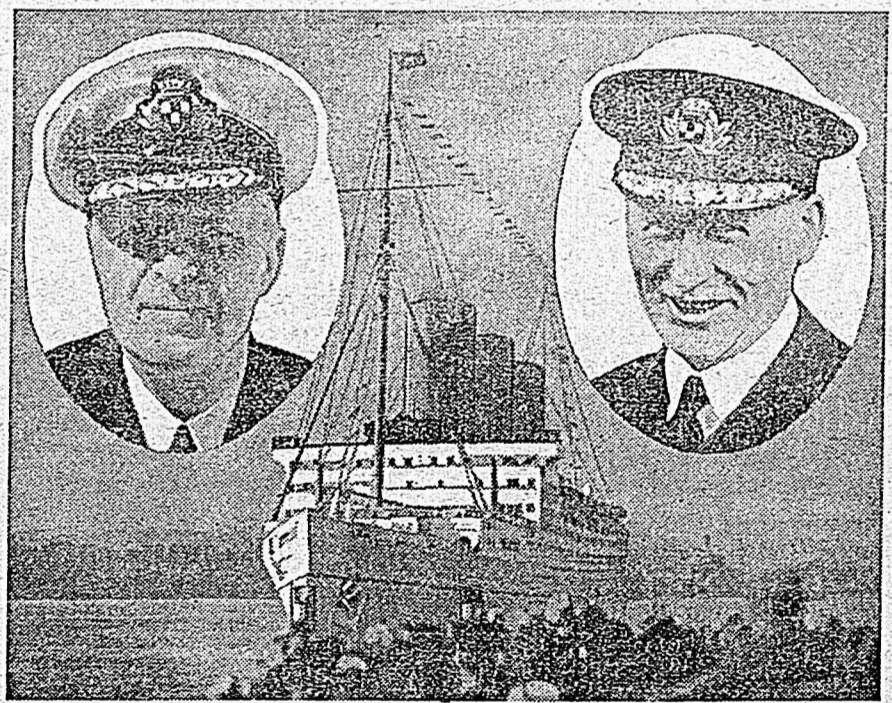

"SEA CHANGE"

A famous Atlantic skipper severed his connection with the sea at the completion of voyage 44 of the Canadian Pacific flag-ship, Empress of Britain.
Captain Robert Gilmour Latta, first Commodore of Canada's big passenger fleet, first commander of the Empire's latest, luxury liner, and friend of Princes, Prime Ministers, and thousands of other travellers from all parts of the world, has been retired under the pension plan of the Canadian Pacific after 30 years in passenger service between Canada and the Old Country.
E. W. Beatty K.C., President of the Canadian Pacific, said in announcing his retirement: "His departure from the sea will be a loss that is balanced only by the gain which will accrue to the land in which he takes up his residence. While it is with regret that his friends in the Company say farewell to Commodore Latta, and that his close association with us comes to an end, all I am sure, join with me in felicitating him upon being still young enough to anticipate

many years of useful service to his community."
At the age of 62 Commodore Latta completes 33 years as a seaman. He started as an apprentice in the sailing ship "Ardenraig" in 1896, and joined the Canadian service eight years later as a Fourth Officer. He was appointed to command in 1923, and became the first Captain of the 42,500 ton Empress of Britain for her maiden voyage in May, 1931, from which date the big liner has not known the hand of any other commander in the course of travelling 320,000 miles.
V. C. Captain Promoted.
Co-incident with the announcement of Captain Latta's retirement was the appointment of Captain R. N. Stuart, V.C., D.S.O., U.S.N.C., R. D., R.N.R., as the second Commander of the big white liner, and the second Commodore of the Canadian Pacific fleet.
Captain Stuart also commenced his association with the sea in a sailing ship, and his appointment at the age of 47 as the youngest Commodore in the Merchant Service culminates 32 years of sea

service which included four and a half years in the navy during the war.
His war service is well known, and as a commander of "Mystery Ships" and Destroyers, he was awarded the Victoria Cross, Distinguished Service Order, and Bar, and the Navy Cross of the United States. Of him Mr. Beatty said, "Captain Stuart's record for his Country is one of the outstanding war stories of the sea, and his record with the Company is equally brilliant."
"Command of the Empress of Britain with her high speed and almost continuous service, calls for men of very high calibre, and I know that in appointing Captain Stuart to the Empress of Britain, and naming him the second Commodore of the Canadian Pacific fleet, we have chosen a worthy successor to Captain Latta."
The transfer of command took place at Southampton July 7, when Captain Stuart took over his new command, and the genial "Jock" Latta swallowed the
