CHAIRMAN RESIGNS

Hon. Dr. David Jamieson, chairof the Mothers' Allowance Commission and the Ontario Old Age Pension Commission, has resigned. Having reached retirement age, he offered his resignation from both commissions. He received a salary of \$6,000 as chairman of the Pensions Board but no salary for his work with the Mothers' Allow-ance Commission. He is 78 years of age, and was a member of the Ontario Government for South Grey. Prior to the 1926 election he was Minister without portfolio in the Ferguson Cabinet but was defeated at the election. He was speaker of the House at one time.




