The Late Mrs. Jas. Porteous

The whole community was saddened on Tuesday morning, June 26th, when the news became widespread that Mrs. Jas. Porteous had passed to the Great Beyond, after a prolonged illness of over eleven months with different ailments. She bore her long illness with great Christian fortitude, possessing that inspiration and strength to face, endure and overcome trial by passing through it. She never complained and her exceptional vitality made it possible for her to enjoy company almost to the last. She was of a very cheerful disposition which won her many friends. She was a devoted wife and mother and a kind neighbor and her presence in the community will be greatly missed.

All that doctor, nurse and friends could do, was done to restore her to health again, but proved of no avail. After weeks of almost painless sinking, she fell into a peaceful sleep on Monday evening, June 25th and her spirit quietly departed early Tuesday morning. The late Mrs. Porteous, whose maiden name was Miss Selena Ethel Sherwood, younger daughter of Mr. Jos. Sherwood and the late Mrs. Sherwood of Eugenia, was born 50 years ago, on June 25, 1854. She lived all her life in Artemesia township with the exception of a few years the family resided on the 3rd line Euphrasia. In the year 1904 she married Mr. James Porteous and resided in Rock Mills vicinity, later moving to the 8th line. To them were born a family of three children, Hazel (Mrs. Fred Duckett), Eugenia; Joe, at home and Richard, who predeceased her about 18 years ago. The late Mrs. Porteous became a member of the former Presbyterian Church at Eugenia during the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Thom. She was also a member of the Women's Association of the United Church and although bedfast was a willing helper.

The funeral, under the direction of Mr. E. J. Bennett, Flesherton undertaker, was held on Thursday afternoon, June 28th, interment being made in the family plot at Salem Cemetery. It was one of the largest funerals that had taken place from this locality for some time. The service was opened by the singing of hymn "What a friend we have in Jesus", after which Rev. Mr. Wolstencroft of Flesherton, who officiated at house and grave, led in prayer. He then spoke on some beautiful passages from the book of John, some of which were "I am the resurrection and the life" and "In my Father's house are many mansions, etc." He related to us that the dead were not dead but are gloriously, intensely and vividly alive in God's wonderful realm beyond and that death was not a state of being but a state of change. Mrs. Alex. Cameron sang, "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" which was a favorite hymn of the deceased. Mrs. C. Hanley accompanied on the organ. Following the closing hymn, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus", an opportunity was given to all who so desired, to view the remains of the departed. The people moved forward and filed reverently past the oaken casket, which was surrounded by floral tokens conveying esteem for the deceased and sympathy for the bereaved. The floral tributes were: pillow of lilies, Husband and son; sheaf of roses, Hazel, husband and family; sheaf of gladioli, her father; sheaf, Mr. and Mrs. John Ottewill; sprays, MacDonald family, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Porteous, Miss Edna McCallum, Reg. Martin and Miss Gertrude Lever, Eugenia friends, Mr. Frank Taylor and children, Mr. and Mrs. Will Cameron, cut flowers, Miss Ada Atkinson; bouquets, Miss Rowena Magee, Mrs. Mary Jamieson of Flesherton, Mr. and Mrs. John Porteous.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Edgar Betts, Garnet Magee, Chas. Hanley, Fred Jamieson, Alex. Cameron and John Ottewill, all neighbors.

Besides the sorrowing husband, son and daughter, there are left in sad bereavement her father and five grandchildren, Leone, Mabel, Gladys, Selena and Freddie Duckett. To all we extend our sincere sympathy. The following beautiful extract was written and placed upon the casket by Mrs. C. Martin:
