SLANDEROUS CHARGES MADE

(Toronto Telegram)

The irresponsibility of Premier
Hepburn in his attacks on public
men and the untrustworthy nature
of his statements is well illustrated
by his recent unfounded and slan-
derous allegations against I. B. Lu-
cas, T. J. Hannigan and C. A. Ma-
guire, in connection with the Mun-
icipal Underwriters' Association, the
organization which has charge of
placing Hydro insurance. Mr. Hep-
burn charged, as reported in four
newspapers, that these men were
officers of Municipal Underwriters
and had made \$30,000 a year each
out of the handling of the insur-
ance.

Mr. Hepburn has since voiced a
partial and grudging retraction but
the facts were available to him be-
fore he made his charges. He denies
now that he associated Mr. Maguire
with those he named in his accusa-
tions but the news reports of his
speech as published in all Toronto
papers quoting his words show con-
clusively that he did. Neither Mr.
Lucas nor Mr. Maguire is or was
ever an officer of the Municipal Un-
derwriters. The Municipal Under-
writers as an organization was for-
med by Sir Adam Beck in 1923 and
licensed for the purpose of carrying
on the business of placing all Hydro
insurance, and receiving the earned
commissions, the Drury government
having refused a license to a Hydro
employee to do this work. The
profits, which varied from \$4,000
to \$19,000 a year, were subject to
Hydro Commission control and duly
checked and audited each year by
auditors for the Hydro and govern-
ment. No personal payments were
made except a salary of \$250 a
month to the secretary-treasurer,
and \$100 a year to T. J. Hannigan,
a director, as travelling expenses.

Direct rebate of the profits to the
Hydro Commission would have been
illegal but the net profits were used
for purposes approved by the Hydro
Commission, the main item being
an annual grant of \$6,000 to the
Ontario Municipal Electric Associa-
tion, to assist that organization in
meeting its secretarial and other
expenses. A copy of the auditor's
report on the accounts was submit-
ted each year to the Hydro Commis-
sion and to the government, the
most recent of such reports having
been supplied to the present govern-
ment some weeks ago, so that the
facts were in the hands of Mr. Hep-
burn when he made his outrageous
allegations.

CREAM

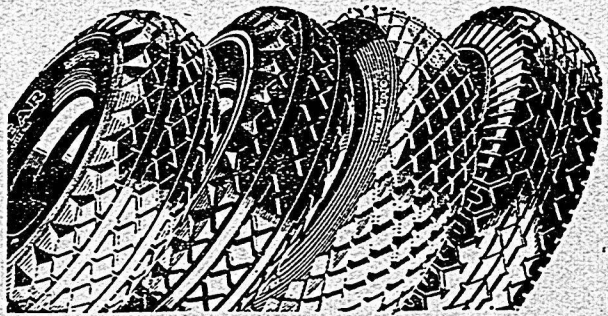
