The late Mrs. Ed. Hillock  
We were indeed very sorry to hear of the passing away into Life Eternal of another former resident of Eugenia. In the person of Mrs. Ed. Hillock. The late Mrs. Hillock, whose maiden name was Miss Grace Adeline Jamieson, eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John K. Jamieson, was born 50 years ago last September. While quite young she became a member of the Eugenia Methodist Church and from that time onward endeavored to lead a Christian life. She made many friends through her lovable and cheerful disposition. She was a kind friend and neighbor and her many fine qualities will never be forgotten by those whom she came in contact with.

In 1912 she married Mr. Ed. Hillock and has ever since resided in the Maxwell district and became a member of the Maxwell Church. She was also a member of the W.A., a member of the Women's Institute, of the Maxwell United Church and Her presence in these circles will be greatly missed.

After over a year's illness with goitre she went to a Toronto hospital in June. A successful operation was performed, but three days followed and pneumonia set in and proved fatal, on Monday, July 23rd. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon, July 25th. Service was held in Maxwell United Church when her pastor, Rev. Mr. Bushell, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Mr. Dean of Fever-sham. Rev. Bushell preached a beautiful sermon based on the phrase "going unto the Father" taken from verse 12, chap. 14, St. John. Rev. and Mrs. Dean sang "Some Day the End will come" which contained beautiful words.

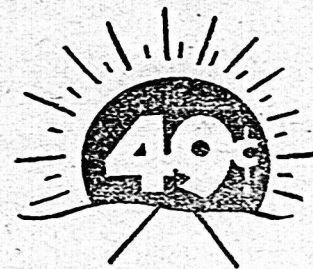

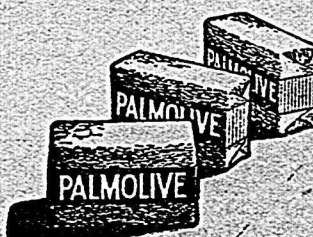
