The late Joseph Halbert was one of the best known and most highly esteemed residents of Euphrasia. He was successful as a farmer and served his township as Councillor for several year. He took a keen interest in many activities and was a director of Markdale Fair for several years, serving as President. He was a consistent member and active in the work of Harkaway United Church. For a great many years he was a member of L.O.L. No. 1045 and at the time of his death was Chaplain of the lodge. He was the last member of the Adam Halbert family to pass away.
