The late Mrs. Robert White, who passed away on Saturday, June 30, at the home of her son, Robert, postmaster at Panaman, Sask., and whose funeral took place at Berkeley on July 4th, was an old resident of that community, having come there as a bride in 1876 and settled with her husband on a farm just north of the village.

She was, previous to her marriage, Miss Elizabeth Boyke, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Francis Boyke of Glenelg township. Born in Ballymena, Ireland, in the year of 1849, she came at the age of one year with her parents to Canada, the ocean voyage in a sailing vessel, lasting between seven and eight weeks. They settled at Dundas, but five years later came to Grey County and took up land near Townsend Lake where she grew to womanhood.

To Mr. and Mrs. White were born seven children, Mrs. J. A. Ledingham (Elizabeth) of Duluth, Mich., Mrs. Leslie Garfat, (Jennie) Assiniboia, Sask., Mrs. John Kirk (Mary) Chatsworth, Ont., William, who died in 1923, Frank, Charles and Robert J., all of Pangman, Sask.

Mr. White passed away in 1910 and two years later the family moved to the west and settled at Pangman, Sask. Here the deceased took a deep interest in the life and development of the little community. Having been a devoted Christian from her girlhood she ever looked for opportunities to help others and win them for the Kingdom. In her passing on June 30th, after an illness of three months as a result of heart trouble, not only her immediate family, who with the exception of Mrs. Kirk, were with her when she passed away, but a host of friends and acquaintances mourn her loss.

An impressive service was held in the United Church, Pangman, on Sunday afternoon, July 1st, the attendance at which overflowed the building. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Beeching, was assisted in the service by Rev. A. W. Smith of Pasadena, Calif., who preached the sermon using as his text "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints", Psalm 116:15. During the service two very appropriate solos were sung, "I will sing you a song of the beautiful land", by Mrs. H. Hollands, and "One by One", by Mr. H. A. Mayeur. Many beautiful floral tributes testified to the esteem and respect of many friends and acquaintances.

Following the service the body, accompanied by the family and friends, was taken by motor hearse to Regina for shipment by train east to Berkeley, Mrs. Ledingham, Charles and Robert, accompanying. They arrived at noon on Wednesday, July 4th and were met by many old friends and relatives who had come to pay a last tribute of love and respect to one they had known for so many years. Service was held in the United Church at 2.30, conducted by Rev. Wm. Howey, whose sermon, drawn from the life of Dorcas, was full of comfort and sympathy for the bereaved. A duet, "Some day the silver cord will break", was sung by Mrs. John Matthews and Mrs. McConnell, and the remains of a dear mother were laid to rest in the family plot, to await the resurrection morn.

Surviving besides the family are one sister, Mrs. John Ritchie of Winnipeg, and one brother, Rev. W. H. Wray Boyle, D.D., of Haviett, Long Island, N.Y., also thirteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Thornbury mourns the loss of one of its best citizens, Mr. Herbert P. Boyd, who died shortly before noon on Saturday at his home on Bridge street. Mr. Boyd passed away after an illness of about two months. As a member of one of the oldest and best known families in the Thornbury district, and one who has always been interested in the welfare of the community, his death is keenly felt.

Mr. Boyd was associated with L. F. Boyd drug store in Thornbury, one of the oldest established businesses of the town. He was born 65 years ago on the Boyd homestead, 3rd line Euphrasia township, being a son of the late John Boyd, one of the pioneers of the district.
