WORKERS ARE OFF TO FAST START IN RACE FOR COSTLY PRIZES

"Club" Vote Standing Shown To-day Finds 7 Workers Closely Grouped As First Lap of Race Gets Actively Under Way

TWO WEEKS LEFT FOR MAXIMUM VOTE

Still Room For Additional Entries in Campaign—Entry List Will Be Closed After This Saturday Night, September 22nd

The bar's up—the track is clear, and every slight entrant in the Standard's big subscription drive has the "right of way!" With the preliminary over, the battle for the Chevrolet Coach begins in real earnest. And it will be a battle—make no mistake about that. Every single entrant has his "eye" on that prize car and believe us, there will be some real action before that Chevrolet is awarded to the top place winner on October 27th.

And, candidates; don't lose sight of the fine cash awards and special cash bonuses which "back up" that fine automobile to be given as Grand Capital Award. You have genuine assurance in this campaign that you'll be handsomely repaid for your efforts in the drive even if you fail to win the Chevrolet automobile.

While the campaign is still in its "infancy" a goodly number of the most aggressive workers have already piled up substantial vote totals in the race. And still others who have not yet secured as many credits as the leaders and threaten to be "right on time" when the first relative standing of workers is posted next Monday noon. After that time two standings of candidates will be shown each week giving the position of each worker in the race. On Thursdays the standings will be shown in the newspaper and on Monday noons handbill standings will be circulated throughout the territory.

Time Grows Short

That means you should rush every available subscription to the campaign department now while the BIG VOTES are still in effect. Don't wait, what is to be done must be done now!

No Quitters Entered

Candidates you are "off at the post" and the pace is growing hot. Your capacity and ability have already been demonstrated. Can you finish as strong as you have started?

You most certainly can if your courage and energy do not fail you. And, if we read human nature aright we reckon that no such "misery" as a quitter will appear among those entered in the drive.

Get in to the race with a shout for you're off in a bunch. And may the best candidate win!

"Second Paid" Subscriptions

Candidates in The Standard's subscription drive have an opportunity of earning extra credits in the race through the sale of "second paid" subscriptions.

A "second paid" subscription is an extension of a previously paid (during the campaign) subscription for one or more additional years. For example, a candidate sells "Mr. Bowen" a one-year subscription to the newspaper and earns 5,000 votes. Another candidate (or the same candidate) sells "Mr. Bowen" another year. The credit for a two-year subscription during the first period is 14,000 votes. Accordingly the candidate selling him the second year will receive the difference between the credit already allowed (\$5,000) and the credit allowed for a two-year subscription (14,000) or a total of 9,000 votes.

The value of any "second paid" subscription may be figured in the same way. Just total the votes already earned and subtract them from the votes on the total term of subscription the subscriber has taken.

Any candidate who does not thoroughly understand the way of figuring these extra votes should consult the campaign manager.


