Our sympathy goes out to the husband and children of the late Mrs. Angus McLaughlin of London. Farmers have ideal weather for ploughing and for fall fairs.

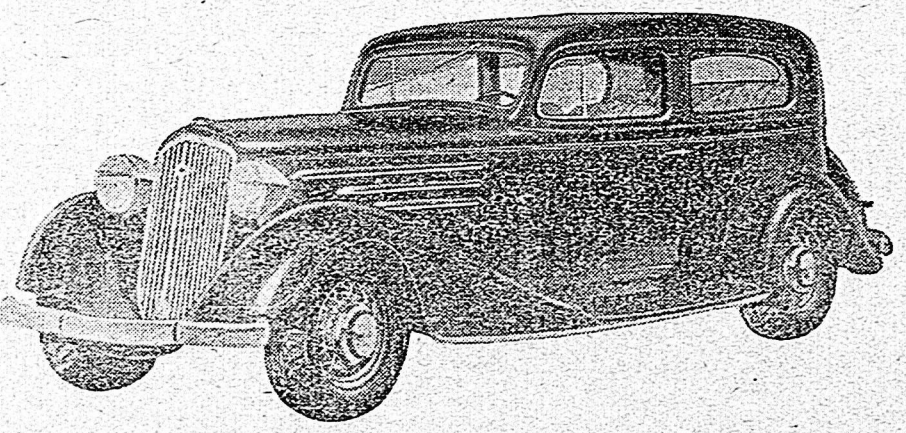

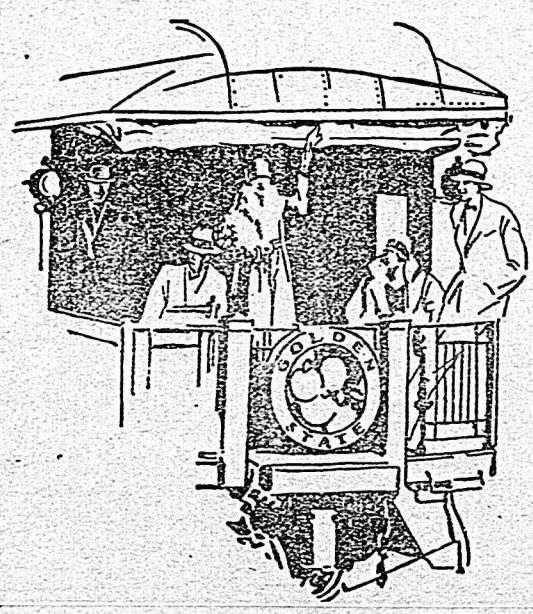
