The Church choir led in the singing and added much to the ceremony. The dedication of the gates was performed at the entrance to the cemetery. Rev. C. O. Pherrill conducted the ceremony while Rev. Mr. McCausland and Mr. R. D. Caruthers unveiled the bronze tablets, one to the memory of the father of Miss Hutchinson and the other to the memory of the pioneer, Dr. D. Caruthers, representing the Township Council and as a resident in the community for many years, spoke briefly at the close.

There was a large attendance at the ceremony and many of the pioneer families were represented. The people of the community deeply appreciate the kindness of Miss Hutchinson in presenting such a fine tribute to the cemetery and community.

The Late John Breadner

The death of John Breadner occurred in Meaford early Wednesday morning after an extended illness at the age of 70 years. Deceased was a native of Euphrasia township where he resided all his life until moving to Meaford some three years ago. He was a student of the Rocklyn and Temple Hill community and was very favorably known and highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was an elder in the Temple Hill church for a number of years and since coming to Meaford was a member of the Episcopalian church. Besides his wife (see Miss Amanda Jamieson) he is survived by five sons: William, Ross, Lorne and Harry, all of whom reside in Euphrasia. He also is survived by five brothers and two sisters, Harper James, and Mrs. Markdale, William Heathcote and Alexander, Hawarden, Sask., and Mrs. Margaret Patton of Temple Hill, and Mrs. Thos. Perry, Lewvan, Sask.

The funeral was held to Lakeview cemetery on Friday afternoon. Services were conducted in the church by Rev. Mr. Crighton at 2.30 o'clock and was largely attended by sorrowing friends and relatives. The pallbearers were his six nephews: Leslie, Laverne and Lloyd Breadner, Melville Patton and James and Clifford Pflug. The floral tributes were beautiful and the flower bearers were also nieces and nephews of deceased.—Meaford Express.

Mrs. John Staples, a well known Glenelg resident, passed away on Thursday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Walter Ball. She came through many trials, six of her children, three sons and three daughters, passed on before her; her husband's sudden and tragic death in July 1931, and the burning of their barn in 1933. Three daughters survive: Mrs. Alethea Dean, Mrs. Annie Fentiman and Mrs. Jennie Ball. Only two of the Harrison family now survive, Mrs. Duncan McNab of Glenelg and Mr. Thos. Harrison of Egremont. Mrs. Staples was quiet and retiring, a neighbor she depended upon to help in any emergency and a woman unafraid of hard work.

DR. W. A. HALL, M.P., CHOICE OF LIBERALS AT BIG CONVENTION

Over 400 Delegates and Many Others Gather at Most Enthusiastic Meeting Held in Durham

Dr. W. A. Hall, M.P., of Walker- John A. Johnson, Mildmay; Dr. J. A. son, sitting member for South McArthur, Markdale; Otto Klein, Bruce, was the choice of a crowded convention of Grey-Bruce Liberals in Durham on Tuesday.

It took four ballots to decide, the doctor winning with 204 votes to go to the ballot being: Dr. Hall, 197 for W. E. Harris, J. L. Lemcke, D. T. Wright, Dr. Porterfield, Chesley.

No more enthusiastic gathering of Liberals ever overflowed Durham Hall. The building was jammed and many could not gain admittance. The delegates, numbering over 400, and those crowded out of the main hall had to assemble in the lower hall for the voting.

After the opening Dr. T. H. Sneath, President of Grey-Bruce Liberal Association, first called for the provisional officers appointed nominations. Twelve were nominated: W. E. Harris, Markdale; Dr. Hall, M.P., Walkerton; D. T. Wright of Dundalk; Dr. A. D. McAllister, Dundalk; Jacob L. Lemcke, Sullinger; John A. Paterson, Hanover;

Seven of these withdrew, the five going to the ballot being: Dr. Hall, 168; Harris, 144; Lemcke, 43; Wright, 40. The third was: Hall, 183; Harris, 180; Lemcke, 42; and the final, Hall, 204; Harris, 197; F. G. Sanderson, M.P. for South Perth, spoke between ballots upon the Bennett Government's record of broken promises.

The provisional officers appointed for the newly formed riding were confirmed by the convention as follows: President, Dr. T. H. Sneath, Durham; Vice-President, David Forrester, Paisley; Secretary-Treasurer, W. E. Harris, Markdale.
