to Mrs. Christopher Schildroth and family in the loss of a loving husband and father.

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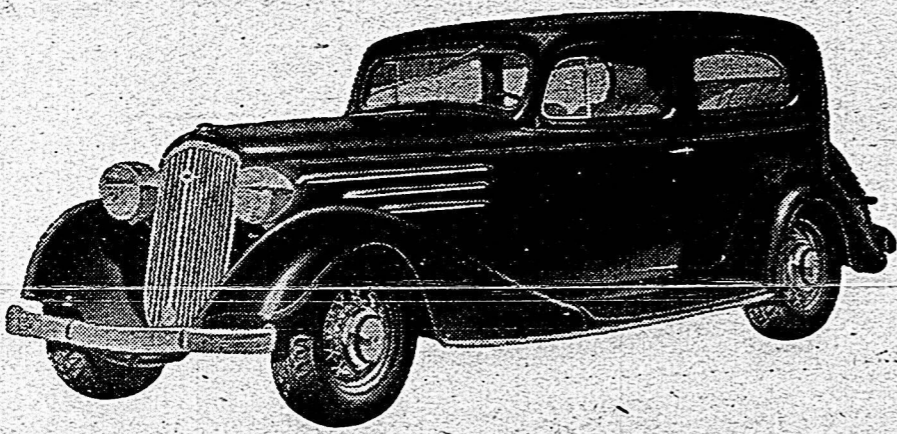
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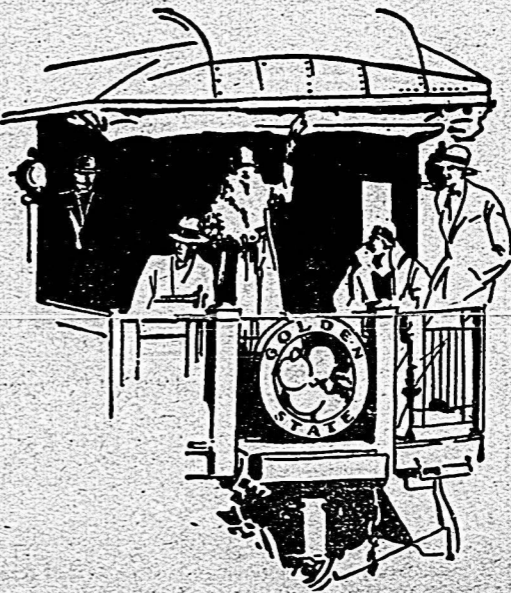


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
